Town Council.

Special meeting last Saturday evening,
Aug. 14th,--all members present.
Clerk read resolution authorizing this
meeting.

Moved by Mr. Sutton, seconded by
Mr. Ballard, that the license ordinance
be taken up for second reading. Carried.

Mr. Jacobs offered an amendment,
providing that all licenses for the sale of
liquor shall expire on the second Wed-
nesday in May of each year,--provided
that licenses granted previous to that
date in 1898, shall be paid for in a pro-
rata fee. After lengthy debate, Mr.
Ballard moved that the ordinance pass
as read, without amendment. Lost,--
vote 3 to 3, as follows:

Yeas--Anderson Nays--Anderson
Ballard Cunningham
Sutton Jacobs

Mr. Andrews stated that he misunder-
stood the question, and it was re-opened
by unanimous consent.

Mr. Andrews seconded Mr. Jacobs'
amendment, and it was carried. Vote,
4 to 2, as follows:

Yeas--Anderson Nays--Anderson
Ballard Sutton
Cunningham
Jacobs

Mr. Jacobs then offered an amend-
ment reducing the license fee from \$300
to \$100, that there might be no monop-
oly of the business. Not seconded.

Mr. Ballard moved to pass second
reading, as amended; seconded by Mr.
Andrews. Mr. Anderson said he was
not satisfied with the wording of the
amendment. Lost,--vote 3 to 3, as
follows:

Yeas--Anderson Nays--Anderson
Ballard Cunningham
Sutton Jacobs

Mr. Jacobs offered a resolution that
further consideration of license be post-
poned, and referred to town meeting;
that Clerk be authorized to publish in
official call for next Spring election a
notice that a vote will be taken on the
question. Lost,--vote, 2 to 4, as
follows:

Yeas--Cunningham Nays--Anderson
Jacobs Andrews
Ballard
Sutton

Moved by Mr. Anderson, that further
consideration be deferred until next reg-
ular meeting. Lost, vote 2 to 4, as
follows:

Yeas--Anderson Nays--Anderson
Cunningham Ballard
Jacobs Sutton

Just then the majority discovered that
the ordinance had been rejected, and
discussion arose as to the method of
reviving it. Mr. Jacobs moved that the
matter be laid on the table. Seconded
by Mr. Cunningham. Lost, vote 3 to 3,
as follows:

Yeas--Anderson Nays--Anderson
Cunningham Ballard
Jacobs Sutton

Mr. Anderson moved to reconsider
the vote by which ordinance was defeat-
ed. Seconded by Mr. Jacobs. (Note,
that both gentlemen voted with the
minority, hence had no right to move
for reconsideration.) Carried.

On motion of Mr. Jacobs, Sec. 3 was
reconsidered, and he offered a substitute
written by Mr. Anderson, by request.
It contains the same provisions as Mr.
Jacobs' amendment, but the wording is
improved (published with the ordinance
in another column.) Carried; vote 5
to 1, as follows:

Cunningham Jacobs
Sutton

Mr. Anderson moved that amended
ordinance pass second reading. Carried;
vote 4 to 2, as follows:

Sutton

Moved by Mr. Sutton, seconded by
Mr. Andrews, that the ordinance pass
third reading and be adopted. Carried;
vote, 4 to 2, as follows:

Yeas--Anderson Nays--Cunningham
Andrews Jacobs
Ballard
Sutton

The question of appointing a special
constable to collect delinquent taxes
debated. It appeared to be the opinion
that the Collector, being a bonded
official, should see to the collections. It
was finally voted that the Collector be
authorized to appoint a deputy, on his
own responsibility,--the town to pay
deputy five per cent on all collections,
in addition to legal fees.
Adjourned.

Hammonton has License.

Hammonton is now a "wet" town.
Those who have preached the glorious
advantages of a grand hotel and one
bar can now sit down and ponder over
their work. We can have a hundred of
them.

But no doubt all the prophecies will
be fulfilled, for the following will be the
"ultimate results" looked for, as they
were promised when license came:

There will be no more "speak-easies."
They will disappear like magic. We
were told that this would happen, and
of course it must be true.

The beer wagons will vanish like
mist. We have license. Good-bye,
beer wagons; they are things of the
past.

No more drunken boys on carousel.
They must now go "dry," while the
men enjoy themselves. Formerly it
was the other way.

There will be a "revenue" for the
town; but of course no costs will result
in prosecutions, as no liquor will be sold
to minors or on Sunday.

Every man who gets a license will
see that speak-easies and beer wagons
are suppressed, and temperance people
will not have to put out detectives.

Yes, "if Hammonton only had a
hotel" has come. Anybody can now
build one. Hotels should spring up
like mushrooms, for Hammonton has
"gone wet."

But the before-election lies, the war
on the preachers, the dragging of a
funeral into a town election, the viola-
tions of solemn pledges, the playing for
advantages, and the acrimony engendered,
are evidences left over from last
March.

How do you like it, you people who
have shed tears over the misfortunes of
others, and who went up to the polls
last March and voted for license--for
one hotel?

Think over it. Hammonton has gone
"wet" the first time in her history.

And who has gained by it? Not
you, nor yet, nor you. Somebody has.
How much revenue will you get?

AN ORDINANCE regulating the Licensing of Inns and Taverns in the Town of Hammonton for the sale of liquor.
Introduced July 31, 1897.
Passed Aug. 14, 1897.
1. Be it ordained by the "Town of Hammonton" that hereafter it shall be lawful for the Board of Councilmen to license and regulate inns and taverns and sale of liquors in said Town of Hammonton, subject to the following conditions: That the applicant for said license shall be recommended by at least twelve freeholders owning property in said Town of Hammonton who shall certify that the person so recommended by him is of good repute for honesty and temperance that said inn or tavern is necessary and will conduce to the public good.
2. Be it ordained that no license shall be granted to any person under the provisions of this ordinance except upon the payment of three hundred dollars to the Town of Hammonton.
3. Be it ordained, that all licenses granted under the provisions of this ordinance shall date from the second Wednesday in May, annually; provided, that licenses granted prior to May 1st, 1898, shall be granted upon payment of a ratable proportion of the fee prescribed in the second section of this ordinance.
4. Be it ordained that all ordinance or parts of ordinance inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance be and the same are hereby repealed and this ordinance shall take effect immediately.
