Moved by Mr. Sutton, seconded by Mr. Ballard, that the license ordinance be taken up for second reading. Carried.

Mr. Jacobs offered an amendment, providing that all licenses for the sale of hquor shall expire on the second Wednesday in May of each year,-provided that licenses granted previous to that date in 1898, shall be paid for in a pro rata fee. After lengthy debate, Mr. Ballard moved that the ordinance pass as read, without amendment. Lost,vote 3 to 3, as follows:

Mr. Andrews stated that he misunderstood the question, and it was re-opened by unanimous consent.

Mr. Andrews seconded Mr. Jacobs amendment, and it was carried. Vote, 4 to 2, as follows:

Mr. Jacobs then offered an amendment reducing the license fee from \$300 to \$100, that there might be no mononoly of the business. Not seconded.




