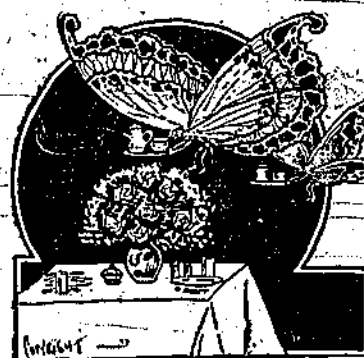

Grange Field Day A Success!

Camden and Atlantic Counties Farmers Grange held their fourth annual meeting in Hammonon Park on Wednesday and Thursday of this week. Special trains and vehicles of all sorts brought hosts of visitors, and no doubt several thousand people visited the Park during the two days.

In the ball, spaces were taken up by demonstrations of enterprises and merchandise, including electricity, drugs, grain foods, cut glass, pianos, phonographs, paintings, hosiery, plumbing, flowers, women's handwork, etc. It was a nice display. In a long tent was found farm products from this and other towns, which made one's mouth water.

In another were implements of every kind; with horse and gasoline power, also automobiles and a hot-air pumping engine which provided fine cool water for the thirsty multitude.

Amusements were on all sides,—the ocean wave, huge swings, bigger babies and cake and coconut stands, and the town's see-saws and swings, with boating, furnished fun for all.

The program was carried out similar to that printed, including an excellent address and baby parade. The judges were handicapped in this event by the crowd, but people seem to be pretty well satisfied with the results, which were as follows:

To the prettiest baby, an automobile wagon, to Louise, daughter of Eston M. Parkhurst.

Cutest baby, a perambulator, to Dorothy, daughter of John A. Hoyle.

Smallest baby, a silver cup, son of W. H. King.

Fattest baby, a teddy bear, to Lena, daughter of A. L. Jackson.

Prettiest twins, two teddy bears, to children of Mrs. Valentine.

The balloon ascension attracted the crowd, and at the second trial the huge fellow went up, the wind driving it to the east. Prof. Flexon, with his parachute, descended safely, landing in the mud opposite the Park.

On Thursday, the crowd was there, all day and evening, in greatly augmented numbers.

The horse parade did not materialize, evidently misunderstood.

The balloon was inflated without a mishap, and ascended majestically, a light wind sending it southward. The professor, in red lights, seated on the bar, hanging head downward, or any old way, chose his time well, detached the parachute and sailed earthward, landing safely about one-fourth of a mile from the starting-point.

An unexpected addition to the meeting's interest was the arrival, Thursday morning, of Battery E, Third U. S. Artillery,—about 180 men and officers and as many horses and equines, with four rapid-fire cannon, wagons and paraphernalia of all kinds. They pitched tents in the Park, within the race-track, where the multitude inspected their tents and witnessed their mode of life.

The soldiers were on a practice march, starting from Fort Meyer, near Washington, spending some time at the state encampment in New York, and later with our own state troops, going thence to Atlantic City by the way of Tom's River, and Tuckerton. They started that evening toward Washington, thence to Philadelphia.

If for no other reason, this Grange meeting should be welcomed for bringing together people from all around and interesting each in the others' welfare and work.

Mr. J. H. Price lives in what is known as the John W. Ballard place, on upper Bellevue. The other day, his children were playing in the attic, and found an old account book. There was nothing to indicate who it belonged to, but we know that Descon Horatio N. Andrews built that house, lived there many years, and died there since 1880.

Some of the items charged in that old book are interesting now, when people are complaining of high prices. For example: under a date in October, 1868, we find hard charged at 24 cents a pound—milk, 50 cents per quart; flour, \$18 a barrel; 80 cents per pound for butter. Evidently, those were the standard prices in Hammoncton just forty years ago.

As Peter Banero, in his auto, was speeding down the County Road on Wednesday afternoon, he met a bunch of teams and other autos near Eleventh Street. In attempting to dodge them, his car "kidded" into a huge telephone pole with terrific force, breaking the pole in half, and smashing the front and interior of the machine. Mr. Andrew Stewart and daughter, of Weymouth, Mrs. Harry Little, and Leroy Jackson and friend were in the car, but escaped with a severe shaking-up. It seemed almost miraculous that no person was seriously injured, especially as a buggy was stuck, losing both hind wheels. The chauffeur was pushing at too great speed, and was not quick enough to shut off when he found himself in a tight place. The local telephone wires were broken, and communication cut off between the Park and town until Thursday morning.

Town Council Meeting.

An adjourned meeting was held on
Saturday evening last, Aug. 15th. All
present, including the new Clerk, W.
R. Seely,

Finance Committee reported having
completed a thorough audit of books
and papers in the late Clerk's office,
assisted by a competent accountant, Mr.
Ernest M. Jackson, and found every-
thing correct. They presented a full
written report.

It was discovered that no collections
had been made for street dirt delivered
on private grounds, and bills for same
were ordered sent.

Bill of E. M. Jackson, for auditing,
\$25, was ordered paid.

Voted, that a competent engineer be
employed, at once, to establish perma-
nent street grades.

Two ordinances were presented for
final action,—one to license billiard and
pool rooms, etc., the other fixing fees
for circuses and other shows. Both
were passed unanimously.

The new liquor license ordinance,
which proposes to divide the town into
two districts, with fee of \$500 in the
first, and \$300 in the second, was re-
ferred back to the committee for legal
advice. Some are of the opinion that
the fee must be the same in all parts of
the town.
