

nent etreet grades. Two ordinances were presented for

final action,-one to license billiard and pool rooms, etc., the other fixing fees for circuees and other shows. Both were passed unanimously.

The new liquor license ordinance, which proposes to divide the town into two districts, with fee of \$500 in the first, and \$300 in the second, was referred back to the committee for legal advice. Some are of the opinion that the fee must be the same in all parts of the town.
