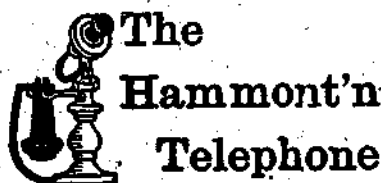

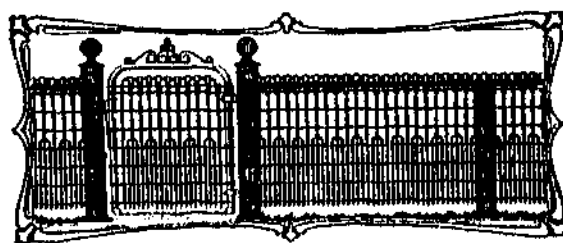

Women's Influence for Good.

EDITOR REPUBLICAN: May we ask you to print the following extract from an article by Miss Jane Addams. "Chicago, one spring had an epidemic of scarlet fever just at the time that the school nurses had been discontinued because business men had pronounced them too expensive. If the women whose children to the schools had been sufficiently public-spirited and had been provided with an implement through which to express that public spirit, they would have insisted that the schools be supplied with nurses, in order that their own children might be protected from contagion. In other words, if women would effectively continue their old avocations, they must take part in the slow rebuilding of that code of legislation which is alone sufficient to protect the home from the dangers incident to modern life. One might instance the many deaths of children from contagious disease, the germs of which have been carried in tailored clothing. County Doctors testify as to outbreak of scarlet fever in remote neighborhoods each autumn, after the children have begun to wear the winter overcoats and cloaks which have been sent from infected city sweat-shops. That, their mothers mend their stockings and guard them from "taking cold," is not a sufficient protection when the tailoring of the family is done in a distant city, under conditions which the mothers cannot possibly control. The sanitary regulation of the sweat shops by city officials is all that can be depended upon to prevent such needless destruction. Who shall say that women are not concerned in the enactment and enforcement of such legislation if they would preserve their homes?"
