WALL STREET.

Not since the summer of 1863 has there been auch a "grip" acquired by the "hulls" on the whole front of the Wall Street stock market, as now exists.

A great "bull" combination led by Keene the heavy operator from "Frisco," Russell S. ge, the man who "ent down" on Milwaukie and St. Paul for so long a time, D. P. Morgan, Sam Milis, Osburne and others assisted by Vanderbilt and also by several banks who are interested in floating the wreck in the North-west and Rock Island Railroad stocks made by Tracy's failure are now manipulating for a highor market, the controlling part of the stocks of rativonds and tolegraph companies representing a capital of not less than three hundred millions

Their argument is, first, that in the general depression of trade-new slowly improvingand in the liquidations which have been going on, railroad stocks fell below their true value and, second, that the great crops of the country will be carried over the roads this fall, and the war, giving a market at good prices, will stimula e the entire business of the ccuntry, and the roads, having already effected great conomy in running expenses will show a large increase in carnings, and at paying rates for all, and investors and speculators will then buy

stocks at the advanced prices. There are those who do not take this reseate view, and Jay Gould is one of them. Letter from Quebec.

One charming morning during our stay in Quebec we made the excursion to Acoutmorence Palls, seven miles from town, From Durham Terrace we had already seen a line of outlages loading in a siz-mag direction; scross the plain, and were told it was the way to the falls. This one long street of seven willed is called the village of Beauport. The houses, which are built closely together, are set at an angle with the street for better protection from the severe winter winds. The most expect end never has more than one window in it, and often nene at all. The French windows are generally, lined with gay colored paper, that do the inner ones, for double ones are necessary for comfort in winter. The day we drove through, the outer filled, many of them, with beautiful blooming flower in profusion, and I neves saw such fine ones anywhere else. It was Baturday, and all Beaufort was putting itself in order for Sunday. Everywhere girls in short skirts were scrubbing floors, front steps, and even the walks which led down the tiny yarder Through the open doors we had many glimpses of Canadian interiors, and we soon learned by observation that that the buge three or four statied stove is a fixture in each household for summer as well as winter. Sometimes it is set in the middle of the house, and the partition walls, are built up fo it so that a part of it is in four rooms, into which the cottage is divided. Besides there were queer old wooden chairs and dressers with stores of family "corumier," and often a wood on crudio which looked as if it might be a heir loom. Our party constitud of five, and we were somewhat dismayed when our carter appeared with his three scated carriage and only one horse, but we were asspred that "Tom" was capable of taking us all with perfect ea "Tem" more than kept up the reputation his master had given him, and we bowled along over the smooth read at a good pace.

bout a quarter of a mile from the fall w left the carriage and walked over a well kept foot-path, to the brink of the cascade, which is one of the most boautiful I have over soon. It is small, but very high, although it's impossible to realize this until one goes down the flight of steps and looks up from beneath. We stayed sometime gazing on its beauty, but felt unsu isfied when at last we were obliged to go and leave the fascination of falling water. Some little distance from here are some natural steps; several hundred, which are about as wonderful as the water full. On our way back to town we passed through the suburbs of St. Rock, which is much more modern than anything in Quebec. It has just been robuilt, as it was entirely burned two years ago, with the exception of the Church and Convent of the Good Shoppard, which were saved miraculously, as the devout Catholic driver thought.

[Written for the South Jersey Republican by one of the most experienced farmers, gardeners and fruit-grewers in the United States.] BHURT-HORNS AS DAIMS COWS.

There are a few mon who are trying to prove that Short-Horn cows are good milkers; but they will not be able to do it, beyond an occasional good one. This breed of cattle is good for boof, as a general rule, and nothing clas-Indeed, they are the best beef outtle in this or any other country. In speaking of the tendency of all they eat going to fat, rather than to milk, a Kentucky dairyman of extensive experience says: "This is the fatal defect in the Short Horn as a dairy cow. Instead of returning the fool in the milk pail she puts it on her bones, where it is not seeded. Again the Short-Horn has been longer before and more widely known to the dairymen of the country than any other thoroughbred breed of outile-Is it not therefore responshie to suppose that it she really did possess the milking qualities these suthusistic gentlemen claim for bor that the dairymen of the country would have reen snough to find it out? I have visted hundreds of dairies in the dairy districts of the country and I remember but one herd where Shorts Horn blood predominated. This is proof youtive to my mind that neither the Short Morn nor her grades have proved successful in the dairy. In this state Short-horns are as obes : as any other cattle; they are not used in the dairy. Most men who breed them use scrub or Jerreys to nurse their calves. It may be argued that dairyman do not use Short-Horns in there herds because they are not willing to pay the

If such wilted grass is allowed to get wer, It is found to keep quite as well as the usual dried hay, especially is this the case where the barns are comparatively tight. Recent experiments are reported, in which the freshly out grass cas after the des was of was allowed the sun but a comple of hours, during which the todder went over it once, and was then raked up and housed in a building, claphoarded tight beneath, plastered incide, and with slight ventilation, at once closed tight and not opened till winter, when the grass came out fresh and bright as the day it was put in the day it was of my au quaintance got the idea into his head, from some theoretical writer, that has was cured too much, that it only required about half the dry ing that it usually requires; so he had his hay put into his barn in a datop condition, and the result was it heated and was spoiled. That man now thinks it best to make changes cautiously in customs that always worked well.

SWAMP MUCK.

Swamp muck generally is not, as a fertilizer worth the cost of bauling it half a mile; but when it is hauled it should be mixed with lime to correct the acidity in it. A farmer writes to the New York Tribune, and states how he treate it : "As the muck was dug, he mixed with every five loads one barrel of fresh I'mo. This was spread evenly in layers between layers of muck a foot thick. In twenty-four hours the heaps were smoking hot, He threw more muck over the ton and vest the surface closely with the shovel to exclude the air, and in a few days the beat went down. When he come to draw the muck, it liad become a black, rich mass, that exhaled a very pungent odor, much. like basnyard manure; although it was late in October when it was spread upon the grass, the color of the field became at once a deeper green and a rapid growth started." This is his story, which as regards the muck having very nungent oder, like I consider to bo-gas. Nor, in my opinion, did his field become "at, once a deeper green," As., when this muck was applied to it; and my objust in quoting this man's statement is to bring to the notice of my readers the book that we often read in the agricultural papers from men who would sooner migropresent a case than tell the trouth. His process was all right to neutralize the acidity of the muck; but to claim that it will, when spread on grass land late in October," have the same effect that only a heavy dressing of wellfutted barnyard manure could produce, is sheer gammon. What the agricultural press needs is more currespondence of extensive experience than they now have; but these papers, with all their anceliable matter, are valuable and should be well supported.

Grain is always subled to more or less loss when stored wating for a market, and butter often deteriorates rapidly in quality after it is roady for a purchaser. Farmars should be their own judges as to a futnre rise in the market, and nut trust to what editurs of leading papers say, who is nine cares to ten are no better judges of the fature than are "level headed" farmers.
