AN ORDINANCE to amend an Ordinance
entitled "An Ordinance to
Provide a Supply of Water for the Town
of Hammonton."

Introduced July 29, 1899.

Passed August 5, 1899.

Section 1. Be it enacted, That Section 12 of
the ordinance entitled "An ordinance to pro-
vide a supply of water for the Town of Ham-
monton," passed June 24, 1899, be and the
same is hereby amended to read as follows:

That this ordinance shall not be construed
as effective unless the said water works plant
shall be so constructed as to secure to the
property owners of the Town of Hammonton
all the rebates and allowances given by the
Board of Fire Underwriters and Adjusters to
property owners in towns having a water sup-
ply of a similar character.

Sec. 2. That all ordinances and parts of or-
dinances in conflict with this ordinance are
hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. That this ordinance shall take effect
from the date of the final passage thereof.

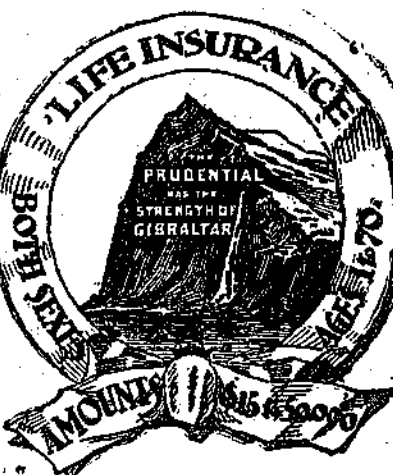

Mr. Editor:—Will you kindly publish the following facts for the information of the patrons of the schools? Hereafter there will be but four grades in the suburban schools. By a recent resolution of the Board of Education, all pupils in the fifth grade and above must attend the Central School. It was also voted that in all the primary grades (first to fourth) pupils must attend the school nearest their homes. It is hoped that parents will ascertain which school is nearest, and send their children there at the beginning of the term, as it will interfere with a pupil's progress to transfer him to another school after he has begun work in any department.

The schools will open on Monday, Sept. 11th. In the Central building, the seventh to eleventh grades, inclusive, will be up-stairs, in the assembly room; the sixth grade will be in the south room, first story; fifth, in the east room; fourth, in the north room; second, in the west room; third and first in the old post-office building, the kindergarten, as formerly, in its own building. These are only temporary arrangements, until the new building is ready. In the assembly room, the large platform has been removed, and the desks, mostly new, all face toward the hallway. Other minor changes have been made in the first story. The Kindergarten and first to third grades will be in the new annex when it is ready.

SANITARY CODE

OF THE

Town of Hammonton

Adopted Aug. 3, 1899.

The Local Board of Health of the Town of Hammonton, County of Atlantic, by virtue of the provisions of the act of the Legislature of New Jersey, entitled "An Act to establish in this State a Board of Health and a Bureau of Vital Statistics, and to define their respective powers and duties," approved March 31, 1887, and of other acts, ordains:

Section 1. That whatever is dangerous to human health, or whatever renders the ground, the water, the air, or food, a hazard or an injury to human health, is hereby declared to be a nuisance, and any person or persons creating or maintaining, or aiding in the creation or maintenance of any such nuisance, shall be liable to a penalty of Ten Dollars.

Sec. 2. That any person who shall carelessly, negligently, or wilfully aid in or contribute to the doing of any act dangerous to life or detrimental to the health of any human being, except for justifiable motives and for adequate reasons, or who shall omit any precaution reasonable and proper to prevent or remove danger or detriment to life or health of any human being, shall be liable to a penalty of Ten Dollars.

Sec. 3. That the sale of any meat or vegetable food or drink that is unwholesome or unfit for food is hereby prohibited; any person or persons making any such sale as aforesaid, shall be liable to a penalty of Ten Dollars.

CONTAGIOUS AND INFECTIOUS DISEASES

Sec. 4. That any physician, midwife, nurse, clergyman, magistrate, or other person who shall officiate at any birth, death or marriage in the Town of Hammonton, and who shall neglect to make return thereof to the proper officer, according to law, and any physician who shall neglect or refuse to report in writing within 24 hours to the Local Board of Health any case of contagious or infectious disease which said physician has prescribed for or attended for the first time since having such disease during the preceding 24 hours, and shall state in such report the specific name of the disease, the full name, race, age, and sex of the patient, his or her residence as precisely as possible, the name of the school which the patient attends, or the factory or workshop at which he or she is employed, if any, the source of contagion or infection if it can be ascertained, and such other facts as may be deemed of importance for the information of the Board. And every physician shall report, in writing, to the Board of Health, the death of any of his patients who shall have died in the Town of Hammonton, of any contagious or infectious disease, within 24 hours thereafter, and shall state in such report the specific name and type of the disease. And every household, and every keeper of any boarding house, lodging house, inn or hotel, shall, in case there of no physician being in attendance, report to the Board of Health the same particulars in the same manner as is required of physicians during any period when said Board shall require notice of such cases to be given, shall for each and every failure to make such return or report be liable to a penalty of Twenty-five Dollars.

Sec. 5. That the keeping of any dwelling house in which there is or has been any polluting or communicable disease without thorough airing, cleansing and disinfection, is hereby prohibited. Whenever the Board of Health in this town shall know of a person sick with any contagious or infectious disease in a house, building or locality, from which the interests of public health require his removal, it may direct the removal of said person to a suitable place, when said removal can be made without undue risk to the person sick, and may cause the premises where such person has been sick to be disinfected; and every person who shall violate this section shall forfeit and pay a penalty of Twenty-five Dollars for every such offense.

FUNERALS

Sec. 6. That there shall not be a public or church funeral of any person who has died of small pox, diphtheria, scarlet fever, typhus fever, or Asiatic cholera, but the funeral of such person shall be private; and it shall not be lawful to invite or permit at the funeral, or at any services connected therewith, of any person who has died of any of the diseases above mentioned, or of any contagious, pestilential, or infectious disease, any person whose attendance is not necessary, or to whom there is danger of contagion thereby; and any violation of this section shall be punishable by a fine of Fifty Dollars.

INTERMENTS

Sec. 7. That no human body of any adult person shall be buried in this town so that the box or coffin containing it shall be nearer than four feet to the surface of the ground, or in the case of any person, deceased, under fourteen years of age, not less than three and one-half feet; and no disinterment of any body shall take place between the first day of April and the first day of November of any year, nor shall any disinterment take place at any other time without a permit from the Clerk of the Board of Health of this town; and every person who shall violate this section shall forfeit and pay a penalty of Twenty-five Dollars for every such offense.

TRAPS

Sec. 8. That any plumbler or other person who shall connect by pipe any building with any cesspool or other receptacle in which said pipe empties, without placing a suitable trap in said pipe between such receptacle and building; and any person who shall have a building in this town from which shall go pipes or drains in such a manner, or in such a position as to communicate directly with any outside surface, or with any sewer, privy, cesspool, or other receptacle, so as to cause a nuisance, or to endanger a health and comfort of the occupants of such house and of those living or passing in the vicinity thereof, shall, on notice from this Board, remove and prevent any nuisance caused thereby, and shall provide a suitable trap or vent fitting opening between said house and any outside receptacle in which said pipe empties; and every person who shall violate this section shall forfeit and pay a penalty of Ten Dollars for every such offense.

FILTH AND RUBBISH

Sec. 9. That the accumulation of any decaying animal or vegetable substance or substance, or of other offensive matter in the form of rubbish, garbage, or filth, in or upon any lot, street or highway, or in or upon any public or private place, and allowing the same to remain in or upon any such lot, street, highway, public or private place, until the same shall become hazardous to health, or until the same shall, by reason of offensive odors, become a source of discomfort to persons living or passing in the vicinity thereof, is hereby declared to be a nuisance, and any person or persons who shall cause such accumulation or allow the same to remain shall be liable to a penalty of Ten Dollars.

Sec. 10. That no person removing garbage, filth, or any offensive or decaying substance, shall suffer it to leak or drop from any vehicle by him owned or driven into or upon

any street, alley, or other public place in this town; and any violation of this section shall be punishable by a fine of Ten Dollars.

DRINKING WATER

Sec. 11. That the pollution of any well, stream, spring, or reservoir of water used for drinking purposes, is hereby prohibited; and any person or persons who shall cause such pollution, or who shall aid therein, shall be liable to a penalty of Ten Dollars.

Sec. 12. That if any well or spring in this town, or any water used for drinking purposes, is found to be polluted, or to be the cause of any sickness, the Board of Health may order the same not to be used, or closed until thoroughly cleansed and repaired in a manner satisfactory to the Board of Health; and every person who shall violate this section shall forfeit and pay a penalty of Ten Dollars for every such offense.

SINK DRAINS, ETC.

Sec. 13. That no pipe, drain, or other conduit, conveying waste, dirty, or foul water, or other waste material, shall at any time be allowed to become clogged or obstructed so as to prevent the free passage of liquid therefrom; and the construction of any drain or sewer, or the pouring out of foul liquids on the surface of the ground in such manner as to become the source from which offensive odors shall emanate, or in such manner as to pollute the ground, air, or water, or to the risk or detriment of the health of persons living or passing in the vicinity thereof, is hereby declared to be a nuisance; and any person or persons who shall cause or maintain, or who shall aid in causing or maintaining any such nuisance, shall be liable to a penalty of Ten Dollars.

CESSPOOLS

Sec. 14. That the storage of animal refuse or decaying or putrescible matter in liquid or solid form in any vault, cesspool or other receptacle in such manner as to endanger health, or in such manner that the same shall, by reason of offensive odors emanating therefrom, become a source of discomfort to persons living or passing in the vicinity thereof, is hereby declared to be a nuisance; and any person or persons causing or maintaining any such nuisance, or aiding therein, shall be liable to a penalty of Twenty-five Dollars.

Sec. 15. That the overflow of any foul liquids or gases into any place where they may become injurious to health, or the keeping or forming such unclean places or excavations upon any lot or land as accumulate foul water or offensive animal or vegetable matter, is hereby declared to be a nuisance, and any person or persons who shall cause or maintain any such nuisance, or who shall aid in causing or maintaining the same, shall be liable to a penalty of Twenty-five Dollars.

Sec. 16. That any owner or occupier of any premises within this town shall cleanse every cesspool belonging to such premises, and remove the contents therefrom, upon general notice in writing to that effect from this Board, or whenever required to do so by ordinance or special notice; and every such owner or occupier who shall neglect or refuse to cleanse any such cesspool for two days after such notice shall forfeit and pay a penalty of Twenty-five Dollars for every such offense.

TENEMENTS

Sec. 17. That the keeping of any tenement house, or other house or building, or any part thereof, in such a state of uncleanness, or the crowding of persons in any tenement house in such a manner as to endanger the health of the persons dwelling therein, is hereby declared to be a nuisance; and any person or persons through whose act or neglect such a state of uncleanness shall be caused, and any person or persons by whom such crowding shall be caused, shall be liable to a penalty of Ten Dollars.

Sec. 18. That any penalty incurred under the provisions of these ordinances, or any expense incurred in the abatement of any nuisance by the Board, shall be collected in the manner prescribed by the act cited in the preamble hereof, or, in lieu thereof, the Local Board of Health may file a bill in the Court of Chancery for an injunction pursuant to the provision of said act. AN ORDINANCE to suppress tramps in the Town of Hammonton.

Introduced July 29, 1899.
Passed August 5, 1899.

Section 1. Be it ordained, That all persons who shall come from any place without this state, or from any city, county, township, borough or place within this state, and have no legal settlement within the Town of Hammonton, and live idly and without employment and refuse to work for the usual and common wages given to other persons for like work in the Town of Hammonton, or shall be found going about from door to door, or placing themselves in the streets, highways or roads to beg or gather alms, and can give no reasonable account of themselves or their business in such places, shall be deemed to be tramps within the meaning of this ordinance.

Sec. 2. That if any person described in the foregoing section of this ordinance shall be found offending against this ordinance in the said Town of Hammonton, it shall be lawful for any constable or police officer of said town, and he is hereby enjoined and required, on notice given him by any of the inhabitants thereof, to apprehend and convey such person to a Justice of the Peace in said town, who shall examine such person, and may commit him or her, being thereof legally convicted before him by the oath or affirmation of one or more credible witnesses, other than the officer making the arrest, to labor upon the streets, roads, highways, or other public works of said town, for a term not less than thirty days nor exceeding six months; and shall forthwith commit him or her to the custody of the Overseer of Highways to carry out the provisions of the sentence imposed.

Sec. 3. That the Overseer of Highways shall be, and he is hereby empowered to incur any necessary expense for the Board and lodging of the offender or offenders, under the terms of this ordinance, subject to the direction of the Council of the said Town of Hammonton.

Sec. 4. That the Overseer of Highways may, at his discretion, discharge such persons at any time within the term of commitment, upon not less than ten days' good behavior, or upon satisfactory security that they shall not become a charge upon the public within one year from the date of said discharge.

Sec. 5. That this ordinance shall take effect immediately after the close of the final passage thereof.


