Registration and Election.

We were not favored by the County
Election Board, this year, with the
advertisement of Registration and Elec-
tion; but we notice the several dates
are as follows:

The local Board will meet next Tues-
day, Sept. 1st, for the purpose of making
their annual canvass of voters.

On Tuesday, Sept. 8th, the Board will
be in session from one to nine o'clock
p.m., to make up the register of voters
from their canvassing books, and to add
names of those who appear before them
personally.

Tuesday, Oct. 27th, the Board will
again meet at one o'clock, to receive
and correct the register previously made,
and add other names.

On Tuesday, Sept. 22nd, a primary
election will be held, for the purpose of
electing delegates to the Congressional
conventions, and to nominate candidates
for the various county and town offices.

The general election will be held on
Tuesday, Nov. 3rd, from six o'clock in
the morning until seven o'clock in the
evening.

The County Board of Elections will
meet at the Court House on Thursday,
Oct. 29th and Saturday, Oct. 31st, from
eight to five o'clock, to revise and
correct the registers made by the local
boards.

Last Saturday, as a Mr. Haines,
of Moorestown, with his wife and child,
were coming up Pleasant Mills Road in
an automobile, they came in collision
with one of W. H. Bernhouse's heavy
wagons, at the corner of Hammonton
Avenue. Mrs. Haines was thrown and
her arm broken at the elbow. The
auto was badly damaged; the wagon
lost a wheel. The blame has not been
fixed, but the machine must have been
making high speed at that sharp turn,
to cause such a wreck.

We regret to learn, through the
"Homes for the Homeless," that Rev.
M. T. Lamb has retired from the Su-
perintendency of New Jersey Children's
Home Society. He was an earnest
worker, in love with his cause, but is
feeling the effects of age, and both self
and his wife need relief from the stren-
uous duties of the position. Credit is
due to Mr. and Mrs. Lamb for the suc-
cess of this worthy movement. He will
serve, however, until a successor has
been appointed.

A dull week this, except for
those who are full of business. Fourth
of July, Our Lady's Day, Italian picnic
and Grange Field Days provided enter-
tainment for six weeks and more; but
those are past, and nothing is billed to
take their place.

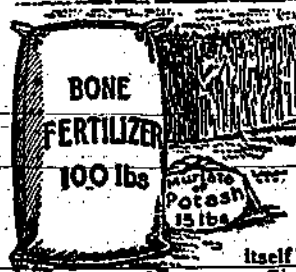
