

The cigarettes work out at one cent each for the lowest grades. This s owing entirely to the heavy duty. The early history of attempts to raise the weed in Ireland should interest Americans. Their old his-torical standby, Sir Walter Raleigh, first started a tobacco plantation at Youghal. As all the world knows, he had learned about tobacco during his adventurous trip to the wilds of Virinia, and it mainly was owing to Raleigh's enterprise that the use tobacco became general througho England and Ireland. It was before the Act of Union between England and Ireland that the growing of tobacco was prohibited in Ireland, in order to protect, as has been said, the American colonies. After 1800, however, the restrictions were re-moved; and then Ireland began to cul-tivate 'tobacco so largely that it aroused the jealousy of England, and again heavy duties were imposed. 


