A letter from Henry Zielz, dated
August 20th, reads in part thus:

We have found this a wonderful
place for fruit. We get all that we can
use, and if we offer to pay, they refuse
to accept it; and if we are backward
about going to get it, they bring it to
the house. It is strange if a day passes
without having several melons. They
are shipped from here at the rate of
three to six carloads a day; and the
season lasts, I am told, from the middle
of June to nearly October.

Peaches are beautiful here, both in
size and color. A friend told me of
twenty-eight peaches weighing forty
pounds. We had a bunch of grapes
that measured seven and a half inches
in width and fourteen and a half inches
long, and weighed four pounds. We
are told that there are often bunches as
large again.

We are delighted with California,
and our lines have fallen in pleasant
places, so far as locality and neighbors
are concerned. But we do not forget
our old home and friends in Hammon-
ton, often wishing we could have Jersey
and California together.

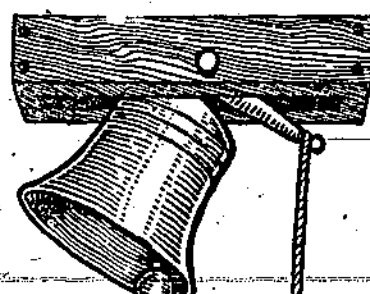
