Detective Department Office of the Prosecutor of the Plens of Atlantic County Atlantic City, N. J., July 81, 1913. S. T. Godfrey, Chairman Law and Order Committee :

I understand that the Italian and other residents of Hammonton who manufacture their wine have been in the habit of selling it in quantities of less than five gallons, without first obtaining a license from the Council of Hammonton for that purpose. I would request that you cause to be published in your papers in Hammonton notices, notifying all persons who are selling liquor of any kind in quantities less than five gallons without first obtaining a license, that they are violating the law, and if this practice is not stopped, prosecution will be started. Of course it is understood that any one who desirés to sell spiritous liquors or malt liquors in any quan tities must first obtain a liceuse for that purpose.


