### Improvement of Twelfth Street.

As most of our readers know, our Atlantic County Freeholders have  
been trying to have Twelfth Street improved, from Hammon Station  
to Buena Vista—our county line. Their efforts have been seconded by  
the Cumberland County authorities, and the survey made to Wheat  
Road, Vineland. The following letter will give an idea of the present  
status of the matter:

State of New Jersey, Department of Public Roads.

Trenton, August 28, 1913.

Mr. C. F. Osgood, Director Board of Freeholders:

Your letter of Aug. 16th received. This department has done all

that it can, thus far, in reference to the road from Hammon to Vineland.

Permission to make the survey was granted some time ago, and

we are informed that this has been made as far as Buena Vista. On

this section there is no question. Mr. Weeks informs me that from this

point to Wheat Road station there is difficulty in securing the requisite

width of 30 feet between gutters, because of a row of trees. As this is

to be a State Road, we think it would be well to drop this section unless

the 30 feet can be obtained. In fact, we must insist upon the full 30

feet between gutters, as it is the intention to make this one of the State

roads, eventually. Very truly yours,

This is a very desirable improvement,—a good road from here to

Vineland,—and at no distant day it will be one section of a long State

Road. Our Freeholders propose to have this end built as soon as possible;

then some way will be found to remove the obstruction mentioned

above, and the work will be completed as planned.

The first Registration Day, for Primary and General Election, will

occur next Tuesday, September 9th, the Board sitting from here to

o'clock p. m. Men who voted at the general election last November

will not need to appear before the Board,—their names will be taken

from the poll-books of that date. If you did not vote then, or if you

have moved into another precinct since, you will have to attend the

Board meeting, and be registered.

The Atlantic County Republican League will have another outing

or "round-up," at Egg Harbor, on Saturday, Sept. 20th, which is

expected to exceed even the "dollar dinner" given at Atlantic City a few

months ago. A special train is expected to bring Hammon people

home. Athletic contests are on the program, as well as dinner at the

hotels, and speeches by prominent men—including former Governor H.

C. Stokes. Tickets may be secured at the committee. For further

information, read next week's Republican. Get together!

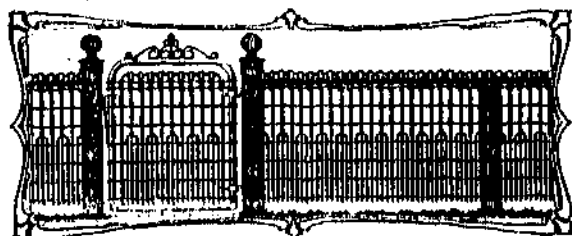

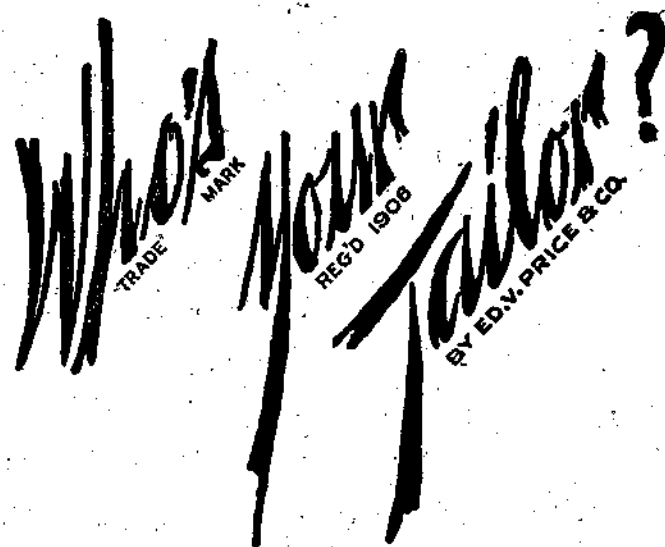

### Warning to Wine Growers.

Detective Department  
Office of the  
Prosecutor of the Pleas  
of Atlantic County  
Atlantic City, N. J., July 31, 1913.  
Mr. S. T. Godfrey, Chairman  
Law and Order Committee:

I understand that the Italian and  
other residents of Hammonton who  
manufacture their wine have been  
in the habit of selling it in quanti-  
ties of less than five gallons, with-  
out first obtaining a license from  
the Council of Hammonton for that  
purpose. I would request that you  
cause to be published in your papers  
in Hammonton notices, notifying  
all persons who are selling liquor  
of any kind in quantities less than  
five gallons without first obtaining  
a license, that they are violating  
the law, and if this practice is not  
stopped, prosecution will be started.  
Of course it is understood that any  
one who desires to sell spirituous  
liquors or malt liquors in any quan-  
tities must first obtain a license for  
that purpose.
