Proclamation.

To the Citizens of Hammononton: September 12 has been designated as the day for the big draft, when all men between the ages of 18 and 45 (inclusive) must register, under the new Selective Service Act.

I, therefore, call upon every patriotic citizen to fly the American flag on that day—from his residence and also his place of business. Gen. Crowder has asked that not only every flag be flying, but also every band be playing. Lend yourselves to the spirit of the day.

I furthermore ask that on that day, at 12 o'clock, noon, the church and school bells be rung, and the fire bells tapped, and the factory and other whistles be blown, in honor of the event. Approximately 13,000,000 men will register throughout the United States, and it is the duty of every citizen to show his spirit.

Let there be no slackers in Hammononton; instead it is hoped that every one eligible for registration will go to the Board early and thus prove his willingness to stand ready in defense of his country. Hammononton boys have done nobly so far—let the good work continue.

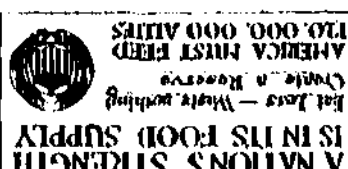

AN ORDINANCE

An Ordinance to Facilitate Traffic on
the Streets of the Town of Hammonton
and Providing Penalty for Disobedience
thereof.

Be It Ordained by the Mayor and Town
Council of the Town of Hammonton:

Sec. 1. It shall be unlawful for car-
riages, automobiles, bicycles, or other
vehicles to park or stand on Bellevue
Avenue within fifty feet of any street
or avenue intersecting with Bellevue
Avenue between Railroad Avenue and
Third Street both streets inclusive, on
Twelfth Street within fifty feet of any
street or avenue between Grand St. and
Railroad Ave., both streets inclusive,
on Railroad Avenue, on West End Ave-
nue within fifty feet of Twelfth Street,
on Egg Harbor Road, Second Street,
Horton Street, Central Avenue and
Third Street within fifty feet of Bellevue
Avenue, or within ten feet of any fire
plug or public drinking fountain.

Sec. 2. The above mentioned distance
is to be measured from the nearest curb
line of said streets or avenues.

Sec. 3. No vehicle shall be parked or
allowed to stand on any street or avenue
elsewhere than close to and parallel with
the sidewalk or footway.

Sec. 4. Nothing herein shall be taken
or construed to prohibit any vehicle from
taking on or letting off of passengers or
the loading or unloading of merchandise
on any part of the above named streets
or avenues.

Sec. 5. That for each and every viola-
tion of this ordinance the offender
shall be liable to a fine of not less than
two (2) dollars or more than ten (10)
dollars and the costs of prosecution.

Sec. 6. If any section or part of a
section of this ordinance shall be de-
clared illegal or void it shall not effect
any other portion hereof.

Sec. 7. All ordinances or parts of
ordinances conflicting herewith be and
the same are hereby repealed.

Sec. 8. This ordinance shall take
effect immediately.

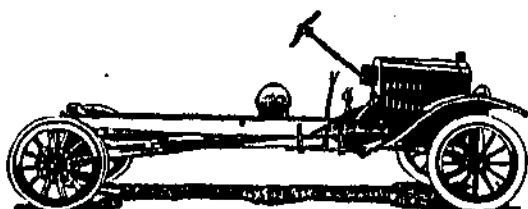

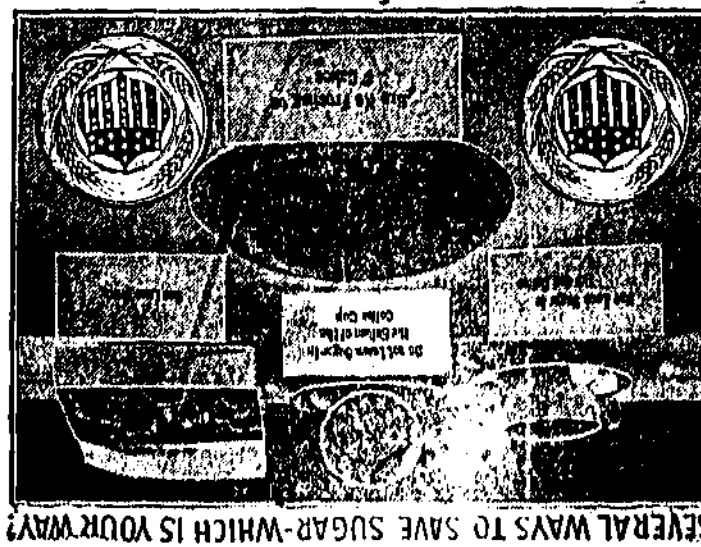
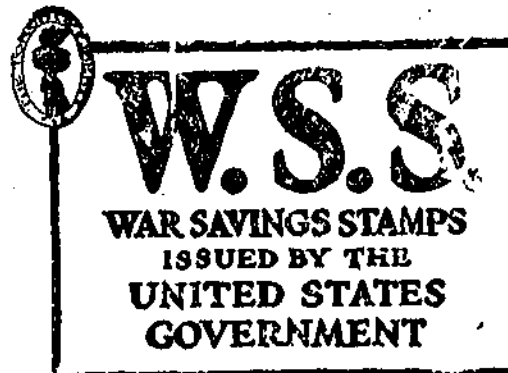
