

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DEPORT OF THE CONDITION

The Water Commissioners to the Public.

The Water Commissioners gladly embrace an opportunity to present to the consumers and taxpayers of the Town of Hammouton both the present status of the water system and the reasons which, in their judgment, make it a pressing duty to increase the charge for water at this

In the first place, it should be remembered that the original issue o bonds by the Town for the establishment and equipment of the water service was \$60,000. A further issue, made for extension on First Road, Thirteenth Street, Fairview Avenue, Main Road and Third St., in 1910, amounted to \$10,000. The interest charges on these issues are \$2850 per adnum; but this sum does not provide a sinking fund for the repayment of the bonds. The first issue will be payable in 1935; the latter in 1940.

It was to be expected that the revenue from consumers would not in the earlier years, meet the expenses of maintenance and the interest, and that, therefore, the cost should be a burden in considerable measure on the taxpayers. Such burden has been willingly borne for the great advantages that have accrued to the whole community by the water service; notwithstanding that the cost of water to consumers has been unusually low. Thus for some years the taxpayers contributed by the payment of the interest on the bouds, while a system was being built up which is a source of just pride to the citizens,—an excellent pumping plant, efficiently maintained, a large distributing service, over a hundred fire hydrants, and a supply of water of splendid quality. The fire pro-tection service alone would have yielded a revenue of quite \$2000 per year from the Town, had the plant been in the hands of a private owner whereas nothing has been paid for this to the Water Department. At the present time, this item would entail a cost of over \$2500 per year.

But with the extension of the mains and the fire hydrauts over s many miles of streets and main roads, the question of aid to the Depart ment, out of the taxes, has greatly narrowed the number of those who do not derive direct advantage of water service, and their contribution is consequently greater in proportion. It is this fact, probably, not less than the normal increase of the municipal expenses, that has impelled the Town Council, in spite of the fact that the town is receiving the fire protection afforded by the Water Department, without allowance, to omit recommendation of any charge on the taxes in aid of the interest on the bonds, or for maintenance during 1910 and 1911. A sum of \$1000 was, it should be noted, granted by the Council this year in aid of the extension of main and hydrant service on First Road, which cost \$2000; this, of course, was an aid in construction and equipment. From the annual statement it will be seen that the water service is self-supporting, even without consideration for the hydrants, which, as has been stated, represent, if commercially reckoned, a revenue value of

at least \$2500 per year; and the income from the extensions of last year and this will cover the charges incurred by their construction. The financial situation may be approximately stated as follows :

Bonded indebtedness on account of water system . . . \$70,000 Interest, 4 pr ct. on \$60,000; 4 ½ pr ct. on \$10,000... . \$2,850 The present normal income from rents \$6,000 Expenses, including interest as above \$5,750

- While the maintenance of the plant is being assidnously and several important economies have been recently secured, there is, of course, a limit to its capacity, and the present Commissioners feel that they would lack in their full duty if they did not now endeavor to make provision for a sinking fund with which to redeem the outstanding bonds at maturity, in accordance with the proper principles of business, sound funancial requirements, and the provisions of the law. They cannot complacently face a situation in which no steps are being taken to pro-vide for the bonds, and thus leave both principal and interest as a continuing unreduced charge upon the resources of the consumers and

In view of these facts, and of the municipal water system having passed the experimental stage, the Commissioners, acting under the powers conferred upon them by statute, and indeed almost imposed on them by law, have resolved to increase the charge to consumers by a general addition of TWENTY-FIVE PER CENT to the present rents. This increase will take effect on January first next. In this way, a sufficient revenue will, it is calculated, be provided to establish a sinking fund that will discharge the whole of the outstanding bonds at their respective dates of maturity; to pay all interest charges; and to take care of all reasonable contingencies in the operation of the service; and withal leave the cost of water in Hammonton at a relatively low figure. And is a further and very important result, the credit of the Town will be naterially strengthened.

Without such a fiscal change, what would be the result ? It would ave been wise to have provided from the time of the first issue, for a ond redemption, but it would be unjustifiable now that experience has lemonstrated the requirements of the service, and the revenue that may e looked for, to fail to do so.

The Commissioners confidently lay this statement before their fellow itizeus, believing that their course will be approved ; and they conratulate the people of Hammonton on the excellence of both water and water service, and the very gratifying development of the town, which, it cannot be doubted, is in a considerable measure due to the eputation of that water service.


