GREEK SOVEREIGN **NEAR EAST RELIEF**

Cables Thanks for Christian Lives Saved in "Beautiful Work" of Mercy

Athens, Greece.—The wonderfu work done by the Near East Relie organization in saving the lives of tens of thousands of Christian throughout Asia Minor and Trans caucasia has received signal recogni-tion in praise beatowed by Queen Sophie of Greece in a cablegram dis-patch by the Greek sovereign to Dr. James L. Barton, Chairman, and Charles V. Vickrey, Secretary, of the



"Deeply touched your great kind-ness towards Greek war sufferers in Straits Area and Asia Minor. Thank

At the same time, the Greek queen sent her check to Dr. Barton, Chairman of the Near East Relief Committee, for 1,000 francs as a contribution to what she termed the "beautiful work" of feeding, clothing and housing the more than 110,000 little children who have come under the care of the Near East Relief during the past year.

Besides Queen Sophio, Admi. al P Coundourlotis, of the Royal Hellenic New who was regent of Greece fol-

Coundourloits, of the Royal Hellenic Navy, who was regent of Greece following the death of the late King Alexander, on October 25, last, has also cabled to express the gratitude of the Greek people for the ald furnished the Christian populations of Turkey by the Near East Relief. More than \$120,000.00 was raised among the Greeks of the United States, in two weeks, and sent to the Near East by the Near East Relief to be used in holping the widows and orphans rendered destitute by the continuation of disturbed condition in the foreign Ottoman Empire. The funds of the Near East Relief are gathered by private subscription no gathered by private subscription no only among Americans, but among the Armentans and Greeks in the

United States, whose countrymen in Turkey and Transcaucasia have been through indescribable suffering. In an oʻlclal report to Charles V. //ckrey, General Secretary of the Near East Relief, Miss Glee Hastings. Near East Relief, mas Glos that Lings, of Spencer, lows, describes the pititible condition of tens of thousand of homeless, starving, half-naked refugees, driven from their homes in the war area, and huddled in stables and out-houses, or on the bare round, for lack of shelter.

"Bloot of the refugees are country people with almost nathing except the clothes on their backs, stupefied and dazed by their mistortunes. Broad is given only to women and children at the rate of one-half location a person, each day. The milk is reserved for the babtes and elck. The refugees sit around, huddled up

reserved for the babtes and sick. The refugees sit around, huddled up against the walls—women with dull, and faces, little children that are blue and pinched with the cold, and to misorably lifeless to cry. One family of five sleeps at hight on a bare store floor, under one thin, ragged half-cotten blanket. In one room several women are wasting away with tube: culosis; in another are some several ye cases, including two young sites. culosis; in another are some severe eye cases, including two young blins, girls, who have no one in the world to care for thom. The overflow from these buildings live in a wooden should with the wails and floors gaping with holes where the wood has rotted away and in tents improvised from raga and pleces of cappet."







This is a copy of an advertisment published in a New Jersey paper which reads in part as follows:

"Now that the good people of New Jersey are allowed" to make 200 gallons of wine for home consumption, let me give you a little advice how and what kind of wine to . It will be worth \$5.00 per gailon when one

Propaganda has spread throughout this state the impression conreyed in the above advertisement, and I would suggest that the time has come for your Department to notify the public that it is a crime against the Comstitution to manufacture, for beverage purposes, any kind of liquors that contain as much as one-half of one per cent alcohol by volume.

Of course this a ivertisement is a clear violation of Sections 17 and 18 of the Volutend Act, as it is also of our State Law.

The action of the last administration gives an excuse for this delusion about home made wines. I refer to T. D. 2765, page 505, Vol. 20, January to December, 1918, and especially the Mimeograph, "Coll. No. 2608," dated October 14, 1920, issued by Commissioner Williams, which relates to "Manufacture of Non-Intoxicating Cider and Non-Intoxicating Fruit Juices Exclusively for Use in the Home." This latter order is subject to the interpretation that it authorizes the granting of permits to make intoxicating liquor for personal use for beverage purposes. Of course such a permit would be null and void, because clearly a violation of the Eighteenth Amendment, and of the Volstead Act. I might add that such a permit in New Jersey would be a "more scrapof paper" because in violation of our State Law.

The grape barvest is close at hand, and alien residents are prepering to make wine in great quantities under this wrong interpretation, chiefly for bootlegging purposes, and somebody in authority ought to speak with no uncertain voice.
