#### Hudson-Fulton Celebration - New York City.

Three hundred years ago, Henry Hudson, an Englishman in command of a Dutch expedition, with eighteen men, explored the Hudson River from Sandy Hook to Troy in his small craft, the "Half Moon."

One hundred and ninety-eight years later, Robert Fulton established, with his steamboat, the "Clermont," a regular water service between New York and the towns along the Hudson River to the North.

This year, New York City, with sister cities and towns along the Hudson will celebrate these two achievements by a series of imposing observances, religious, historical, military, naval, musical and literary, extending from Sept. 25 to Oct. 9.

Replicas of the "Half Moon" and the "Clermont" have been built and will play a large part in the celebration. They will be the center of attraction in the great naval pageant on Saturday, September 25. The United States Government will have fifty-two war ships anchored in the Hudson, and Great Britain, France, the Netherlands, Italy, Germany, Argentina, Guatemala, Mexico, and Cuba will be represented by war vessels.

Two great parades of water craft will escort the "Half Moon" and "Clermont" in triumphal procession past the war leviathans, first in the morning and again in the evening, when all the vessels will be illuminated.

On Sept. 28 there will be a grand historical pageant, and on Sept. 30 a big military parade in New York City.

On Oct. 1, the "Half Moon" and "Clermont" will proceed up the Hudson to Troy, escorted by hundreds of river craft, including torpedo boats.

A magnificent carnival parade will be held in New York on Saturday evening, Oct. 2, which promises to eclipse all previous attempts.

### Governor Fort's Sentiments.

As to the Atlantic City situation, I have not been in touch with it. Before leaving I suggested to the Attorney General what he should do, and, as I understand it, he has taken the course recommended. The act of 1901, under which the notice was given to the Mayor of Atlantic City, is a very stringent act. Of course it is without force unless the Grand Jury of Atlantic County does its duty. Flagrant violation of the law and open defiance of all authority in Atlantic City and County is an object lesson to the people of the state. It is a matter which the Legislature will not be able to escape, in my judgment, at its next session. It is not fair to Newark, to Paterson, Jersey City, and the other municipalities of the state, to permit one place to violate the law openly and to reap large profits from such violation, while the others are prohibited and persons punished if they attempt to do the same thing.

The Legislature will be face to face with the condition at its next session. The subject matter was not brought to the attention of the last Legislature by the Governor for the reason that it was hoped that after the experiences of last year, the open and flagrant character of the violations of the law in Atlantic City would cease. The law as it exists should be obeyed in every place, and if it is not right it should be changed or repealed by the Legislature. The defiance of law leads to anarchy. - *Phila. Papers.*

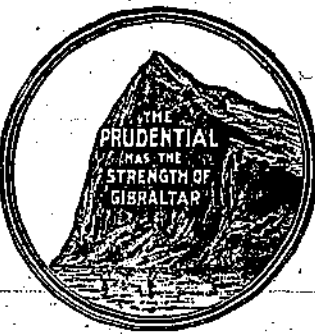

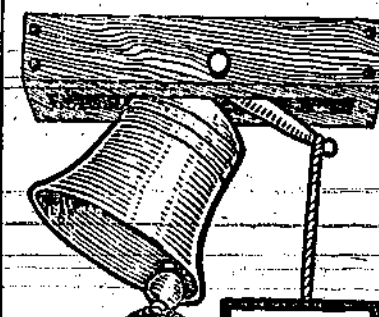
