Shade Trees Suffering Early Leaf Drop

In view of the fact that many of the shade trees in Hammonton are rapidly losing their foliage, and this fact has aroused considerable consternation, it seems pertinent at this time that steps be taken to prevent similar trouble next year.

This early leaf drop is no doubt due to climatic and soil conditions, as our summer has been a rather severe one.

In many cases it would be well to thin out some of the branches in the tree, where they are too close. This is best done by removing the entire branches from the interior, rather than by tipping back side branches or cutting back the top.

Fertilizer will also help to improve the condition of the tree. If possible, give a liberal dressing of manure, and fork it into the soil over a space as large as the diameter of the top; or where pavement interferes, make the application over as large an area as possible.

In March it would be well to make a second application of good manure, and also one of commercial fertilizer, at the rate of three pounds to one hundred square feet of ground, using the following materials in these proportions:

- 1 Nitrate of Soda
- 1 Bone Meal
- 1 Acid Phosphate
- 4 Hard-wood Ashes
- Or 3 Acid Phosphate
- 1 Nitrate of Soda
- 5 Tobacco Stems
- 5 Slaked Lime.

The manure application need not be repeated again, but the other materials may well be used again in May. No further attention should be required, other than to keep sod from forming where tree is planted close to curb and pavement.

This fertilizer application can be profitably made once each Spring, thereafter.
