

Since it is understood that the admi-  
stration strongly supports the Nica-  
ragua Canal bill and the bill to promote  
American shipping, democratic opposi-  
tion to these measures at the coming  
Congress is actively crystallizing. It is  
to be expected of course that Democrats  
will oppose anything advocated by Re-  
publicans without regard to the merits  
of the question; but it will be found that these  
are more than Republican or admini-  
stration measures. The need of the  
country demands for every reason a  
halt cut between oceans, and there is  
also a highly popular demand that we  
should carry our own ocean freight, for  
which we now pay foreign ships, accord-  
ing to such eminent authority as Senat-  
or Frye, July \$100,000,000 a year.

Commenting upon the evident deter-  
mination of Democratic leaders to keep  
free silver at the front in the campaign  
of this fall and in 1900, the New York  
World remarks that "In 1896 the Dem-  
ocratic party was beaten 603,514 on the  
popular vote, and 95 in the electoral  
college, and since then has lost four  
States with 21 electoral votes, and gained  
only Kentucky, which is likely to be  
lost again this year."

Some of our Jersey exchanges, says  
the *Paterson Call*, are worrying them-  
selves over the probable state issues to  
be fought in the coming fall campaign.  
As a matter of fact, there is only one  
issue, and that is to preserve the integ-  
rity of the party that upholds the  
administration that has brought us the  
good times our country is enjoying. In  
the absence of any apparently important  
state issues, it behooves every good citi-  
zen to make the coming election a  
preliminary skirmish to the national  
battle to be fought a year hence.

It turns out that the attacks upon  
Penelon Commissioner Evans are large-  
ly due to the fact that he has dropped  
from the roll of claim agents and pen-  
sion attorneys more than 30,000 men.  
When he came into office the names of  
more than 50,000 attorneys were on the  
record of the Pension Office, and to-day  
the number is 19,491. Many of these  
names have been dropped because of  
fraudulent practices. The amount paid  
to the claim agents last year was \$479,-  
300, compared with \$730,000 in the pre-  
ceding year, a saving of \$253,000 to  
the nation and a loss of that amount  
to the claim agents. Hence the  
vigil of the thought which they have waged  
disobedience of the agents and the  
against Mr. Evans.

**AN ORDINANCE to suppress tramps in the Town of Hammonton.**  
Enacted July 29, 1899.  
Passed August 5, 1899.

Section 1. Be it ordained, That all persons who shall come from any place without this state, or from any city, county, township, borough or place within this state, and have no legal settlement within the Town of Hammonton, and live idly and without employment and refuse to work for the usual and common wages given to other persons for like work in the Town of Hammonton, or shall be found going about from door to door, or placing themselves in the streets, highways or roads to beg or gather alms, and can give no reasonable account of themselves or their business in such places, shall be deemed to be tramps within the meaning of this ordinance.

Sec. 2. That if any person described in the foregoing section of this ordinance shall be found offending against this ordinance in the said Town of Hammonton, it shall be lawful for any constable or police officer of said town, and he is hereby authorized and required, on notice given him by any of the inhabitants thereof, to apprehend and convey such person to a Justice of the Peace in said town, who shall examine such person, and may commit him or her, being thereof lawfully convicted, to the Town of Hammonton, or shall be found going about from door to door, or placing themselves in the streets, highways or roads to beg or gather alms, and can give no reasonable account of themselves or their business in such places, shall be deemed to be tramps within the meaning of this ordinance.

Sec. 3. That the Overseer of Highways shall be, and he is hereby empowered to incur any necessary expense for the Board and lodging of the offender or offenders under the terms of this ordinance, subject to the direction of the Council of the said Town of Hammonton.

Sec. 4. That the Overseer of Highways may, at his discretion, discharge such persons at any time within the term of commitment, upon not less than ten days good behavior, or upon satisfactory security that they shall not become a charge upon the public within one year from the date of said discharge.

Sec. 5. That this ordinance shall take effect immediately after the date of the final passage thereof.
