

RESPONSIBILITY.

The Coroner's jury, two weeks ago, exonerated the railroad employes (not the Company) from all blame in causing the death of Mr. and Mrs. Nott; but reflected public sentiment in recommending that a watchman be stationed at that Thirtieth St. crossing of the Atlantic City railroad.

Railroad companies exist and do business by consent of the State, and by the payment of taxes every year, admit that they are subject to legal control. It seems to us that those wealthy corporations should not be permitted to do business in a manner that endangers human life. We do not believe that the responsibility for a man's safety should be placed entirely upon himself. We do not think that a simple warning by whistle should be considered ample protection by the railroads—especially when a train is speeding toward the danger point at a rate exceeding a mile a minute; but they should place such safeguards about their crossings that casualties like the one above referred to would be impossible.

Such protection will some day be required, or all crossings at grade be prohibited.

The State Board of Education, through its Committee on Education, announces that an examination for the position of Superintendent of the County of Atlantic will be held at Mays Landing (probably September 23rd, 1905), on a day during the month of September, 1905, to be hereafter announced through these columns. Everybody qualified by law to hold such position is asked to compete. Candidates may send their names to Hon. Regarding Telephones.

In Pittsburg, Pa., a preliminary in-
spection is being made of the tele-
phone systems independent of the
Bell lines. It is proposed to organize
a central operating long-distance com-
pany of them. There are \$12,000,000
invested in this manner, and the lines
are all to be united under one com-
pany, capitalized at first at \$50,000,000,
then later at \$200,000,000. Among
those attending the inspecting party
are William Finnan and all the officials
of the Pittsburg and Allegheny Tele-
phone Company; Breckenridge Jones,
of the Mississippi Valley Trust Co.,
St. Louis; Col. Adolphus Busch, of
Anheuser-Busch-Brewing Co.; C. M.
Foster, of the Kinloch Telephone Co.,
and about twenty telephone men and
capitalists from the middle west.

J. B. Hoge, President of the Inter-
state Telephone Association, outlined
the purpose of their visit to Pittsburg
as follows:

"It is not generally known, but
there are more independent phones in
existence in the United States than
Bell phones. There are 2,500,000 inde-
pendent phones in use, to 2,000,000
Bell phones. The purpose of our
inspection is to form a consolidation
of these independent companies, so
far as the long-distance end of the
business is concerned. Cleveland, and
in fact the State of Ohio, has a mag-
nificent independent telephone sys-
tem, but we have poor connection
with cities outside the state."

Hammonton is interested in this
movement. If it succeeds, our new
local company will have practically
unlimited long-distance connections,
the lack of which is the only obstacle
in the way of its success.
