N ORDINANCE relating to a Vol-unteer Fire Department. Introduced July 30, 1898. Passed August 27, 1898.

Bec. I. Be it ordained by the Town of Hammonton; that all fire companies existing, or which may hereafter exist in the town of Hammonton and operating under control of Town, shall hereafter be known as "The Fire Department of the Town of Hammonton," and the present existing volunteer fire Company," and the "Independent volunteer fire company, which may hereafter be organized may be admitted to this department by and with consent of council.

See. 2 And be it ordained, that the several fire companies companing said Fire Department, shall be subject to all the laws of the State pertaining to fire departments in towns

State pertaining to fire departments in towns and may receive any benefits resulting there-

from.

Sec. 3. And be it ordained, that there shall be elected by Council, in the month of Ootober in each year, or whenever a vacancy occurs, a Fire Chief, who shall have command and control of said Fire Department, including engines, hese, or other apparatus or appliances necessarily used in fire departments, and may require the fire companies to keep the same in good condition at all times. He shall also have full charge of, and command the firement and fire apparatus during all convients of fire or emergency. He shall also have control of ail public electric, public pumps, or other supplies of water on coessions of emergency from fire or otherwise, and may require one or more of said companies to empty any electric or oisof said companies to empty any distorn or ele-torne requiring cleanly, or repairing, and shall also have charge of any distribute any material required for the use of the firemen, engines, hose, hose-carts, ladders, trucks, etc., provided

fron Visiting Cards.

So many dainty cards are made in the resent day that it seems like going back to less luxurious times to talk of risiting cards made of iron. Such cards, bowever, were not very long ago introduced as a novelty on the continent of Europe, and so far from being a step backward toward the days when luxuries were unknown, they have proved that it is possible for paper to be excelled by iron, even on its own ground. The cards were not really a novelty, but only a former novelty revived. The first time they were heard of was at the first Universal Exhibition, at London, 1851. The exhibit, which was made by an American firm, awoke the emulation of British manufacturers, and a lively competition in iron-rolling ensued, its object being to see to what degree of thinness the metal could be olled cold.

Mr. Gillott succeeded in rolling sheets the average thickness of which was the eighteen hundredth part of an inch. In other words, eighteen hundred sheets piled upon one another would measure an inch in thickness, while of the thinnest tissue paper to be bought only twelve hundred sheets could be piled to an Inch. The Paper Maker's Journal says that these thin iron sheets are perfectly smooth and easy to write on, though they are seen to be porous when




