





### Construction of Railroad Fire Lines

Pursuant to Chap. 74. Laws of 1909, notice is hereby given that the Forest Park Reserva-tion Commission of New Jersey proposes to require the making of Fire Lines across private modification of the Atlantic City Railroad Company at the following noints:

following points:

1. On the Gloucester Branch, both sides of the track, between the north branch of Timber Creek and Hillop Station, in Gloucester Tp.,

Camden County.

2. On the Cape May Branch, both sides of the track, between Tuckshoe station and Woodbine station in Upper Township and Woodbine

bine station in Upper Township and Woodbine borcugh, Cape May county.

3. On the Ocean City Branch, both sides of the track between Ocean City Junction and Palermo, in Upper Township, Cape May Co.

4. On the main line; A, both sides of tracks—between-Williamstown\_Junction\_and Winstow Junction\_in Winstow Junction\_in Camden—County.— E. Adjoining the south-bound track only, between Hammenton and Egg Harbor in the Town of Hammonton and Township of Mullica, Atlantic County.

Egg Harbor in the Town of Hemmouton and Township of Mullion, Atlantic County.

These lines will extend and supplement those already constructed by the said railroad company, and will be made in the same manner. That is, a refety belt 10 feet wide, and 100 feet on its inner side from the nearest rail, will be entirely cleared of all trees, brush, etc.—From the 100 foot sone lying between the safety belt and the track, only the brush and smaller trees will be removed. On this portion of the fire line, all trees above three inches in diameter and at a safe distancy, usually not less than 6 feet from other trees, will be allowed to stand Section 4 of the law provides:

4. If the owner of any woodland shall object

to the construction of the proposed fire line upon his proporty, he shall file within aftern days of the date of said maticaction or of said adadvertisement, with the Forest Park Reserve Commission, at objection therete, which objec-tion shall contain such description of the property as shall be necessary to establish its loca-tion. The owner of any woodlands who shall not file, for any reason, an objection to the construction of said fire line, within the time specified, shall be deemed to have given his consent thereto. If the owner of any woodland file, as above specified, his objection to the proposed construction, the Forest Park Reservarioo Commission if it deem the construction of the fire line through said property to be a public necessity, shall notify him by registered mail to show cause before the Commission, at such time as it may appoint (which time shall be not less than ten days from the date of said notice) why the fire line should not be con-

notice) why the tire time should not be constructed as proposed. After said hearing the Press Park Reservation Commission may entering the objection or may order the fire line out as proposed and its decision shall be final.

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
