More Endorsements of Mr. Walsh. MR. WALSH AS A PATEASON WORKINGMAN

Now that Cornelius Walsh has been brought so prominently before the people of New Jersey by the Republican nomination for Governor, some reminiscences of his career in this city will be of interest to our readers.

It must be thirty-five or thirty seven veurs ago that Mr. Walsh came here from Belleville, where his parents and other relatives reside. He was a silver plater by trade, and first found employment in Col. Samuel Colt's gun mill, still standing opposite the corner of Mill and Van Honten streets, the establishment being afterwards removed to Hartford, where it has attained a world-wide reputation. Afterwards, Mr. Walsh was employed by Godwin, Clarke & Co., machinists, in the third story of that old red mill adjoining the office of the Danforth Locometive and Machine Company and still used by that company as a machine shop. future Governor of this important little
Commonwealth toiled twelve or fourteen
hours a day as a filer and polisher, and hours a day as a filer and polisher, and probably then and there acquired that slight stoop so usal among hard working toilers at the machinist's bench. 'At this time Mr. Walsh boarded with Major John Edwards, and we can imagine how surprised they would have been could they have taken a peep behind Futurity's veil, and seen one of them acting as Vice-President over a Convention of a thousand of dent over a Convention of a thousand of the best citizens of the State, nominating the other for Chief Magistrate of a million people. It was from Major Edward's house that Mr. Walsh went to Belleville to marry his wife. It was in Paterson, too, that he allied himself with the church, and these are allied himself with the church, and there are, doubtless, thousands here who have been thrilled with the recital from his own lips, of that memorable scene in the old Cross street M. E. church more

than thirty five years ago, when he was but eighteen years of age. There are still quite a few of his fellowworkmen in Paterson who recollect him with pleasure, and who will roll up their sleeves and go into the political canvary with a right good will, to put an old shopmate into the Gubernatorial chair, which has never before, we believe, been filled by so distinctively a workingman as Corcolius Walsh .- Paterson Press.

Dr. Greeley comes out again in the N. Y. Tribune on the subject of the Presidency and re-defines his position as follows:

The "personal views of Mr. Greeley on this point are exactly these: He favors the One-Term principle, and believes that another Republican candidate for President can be selected who will encounter less opposition and win more support than Gen. Grant; and he therefore a proposition and win more support than Gen. Grant; and he therefore advocates such selection. But, should his views be overruled and Gen, Grant nominated, he holds his election infinitely preferable to that of any candidate whom the Democrate may nominate; for a Democrat triumph involves the return to pow er of the great mass of those who for years plotted the disruption of our Union and at length forced the Southern States into secession and rebellion contrary to the wishes and the judgment of a decided majority of their people. A Democratic triumph involves the ascendancy of those who hate the Nation's creditors because their money powerfully contributed to the overthrow of the rebellion, and will find a way to cheat them if possible. a Democratic triumph involves the subversion of protection to our home industry, with a repetition of the wide-sproad disasters and naturally followed such overthrow. The "personal views of Mr. Greeley" impel him to deprecate a Democratic national triumph as one of the gravest of national calamities; and this is the main reason for wishing the selection of a Republican candidate for President who will be more certain of success than Gen. Grant.






