EDITORS: The recurrent cases of diphtheria with which this community has been afflicted during the past two years would seem to indicate a laxity in quarantine methods, which if true is unpardonable; and I am credibly informed that such laxity does really exist. In that the bedding and clothing of the victims of this dread disease are not burned, as proper sanitary practice demands.

Is it not about time that the more intelligent of our citizens take hold of this situation in a more radical way, and obtain out-of-town expert assistance, if necessary, in order to stamp out this pest?

It can be done. All that is necessary is to face the situation like intelligent men, instead of weakly assenting to the continuance of conditions which are little short of being criminal.
