Introduced July 29. 109.

Section I. Be it exacted, That Section 12 of the ordinance sutilted "An ordinance to provide a supply of water for the Town of Hammonton," passed June 24, 1899, be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows. That this ordinance shall not be constructed as effective unless the said water works plant shall be so constructed as to accure to the property owners of the Town of Hammonton all the rebates and allowances given by the Board of Fire Underwriters and Adjusters to property owners in towns having a water sup-


