An adjourned meeting was held on Friday evening, 16th, for the purpose of conferring with Mr. Haines, the surveyor who made the excellent maps of Hammononton now used by our assessors. No action was taken, but considerable information and good advice were given by Mr. Haines. He may be employed to fix street grades, etc., the job which Mr. Middleton abandoned for some reason. Adjourned to meet on Tuesday evening, 20th inst.

LOTS OF WET.

On last Tuesday evening, Town Council changed their minds, and voted Messrs. Heck and D'Giacomo licenses to re-open saloons, to be operative yesterday, the 23rd.

Their reasons for so doing are understood to be as follows: Pity for the half-hundred thirsty petitioners who had for several weeks suffered excruciating pains, caused by lack of stimulants. Pity for the hotel proprietors, whose business was going to the dogs from lack of patronage. Then there were several political reasons, of which the least said is the best.

The vote was as follows: Heck application: yeas, Messrs. Baker, Dilger, Rogers, White, Wood; nays, Mayor Austin, Mr. Coggey.

5 to 2. Messrs. Dilger and Wood reversed their vote of July 12th. D'Giacomo application: yeas, Messrs. Dilger, Rogers, White, Wood; nays, Mayor Austin, Messrs. Baker and Coggey. 4 to 3. Mr. Wood changed his previous vote, for the sake of harmony.

We wish to publicly commend Mayor Austin and Mr. Coggey for stand in the Heck case, and also Mr. Baker on the D'Giacomo application.

The action taken as stated above was in accordance with Solicitor Stockwell's decision that a reconsideration was allowable.

Mr. Heck was given to understand that he must comply with all the laws and resolutions, no card playing, no treating, no selling on Sunday nor to minors, and his bar must be closed at 11 p.m. The other saloon keepers will be notified to the same effect, and an eagle eye will be kept upon them by the Mayor and Councilmen.

Council has set a bad precedent in these cases, which is apt to be followed on any question. The people can have no confidence in them, as their action of to-day may be reversed to-morrow.

A watchman being needed at Twelfth Street crossing at night, Clerk was instructed to notify the Penna. R. R. Co. also to place a bell at Sanitarium crossing.

Adjourned to meet next Tuesday evening, 27th inst.
