Whatever the remote cause of a vol canle eruption may have been it is difficult to believe that the immediate eause can be anything but a glgantic explosion of steam in the bowels of the earth. It is known that water penetrates to considerable depths in the earth, even in the middle of continents. This water goes as deep as the gradually increasing heat of the planet will perout it to do while retaining the liquid form. When, however, I encounters heat sufficient to fiquety solld bodies, it is changed into superheated steam-a thing whose resistless power defies the mightlest bonds, and even the rocky crust of the earth cannot withstand the explosive energy that is thus brought to bear upon it. The question often arises as to why these explosions do not occur anywhere. This rate is far above that of any other country in the world, and is two and a half times the number of divorces in proportion to population, which revailed forty years ago.
