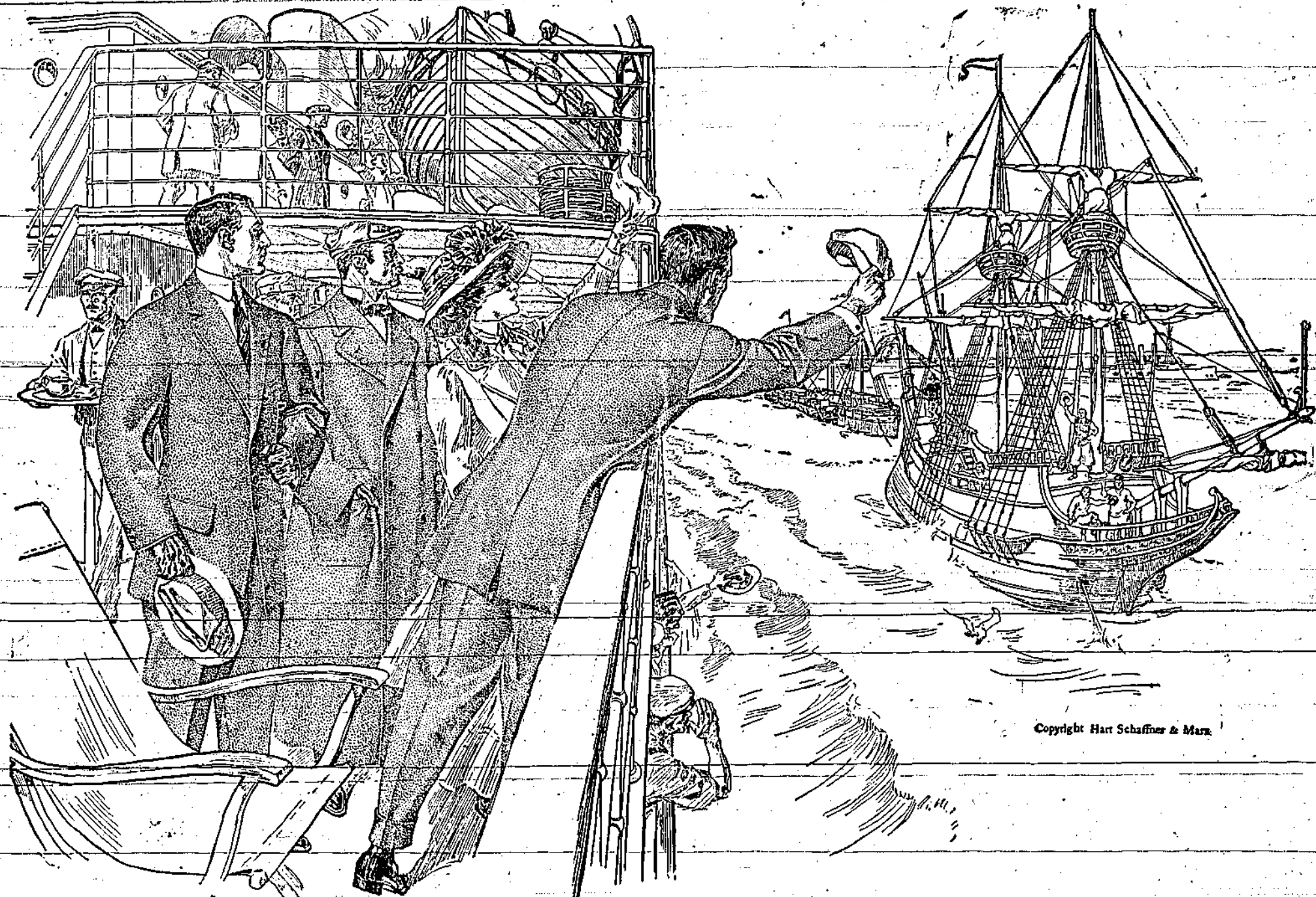

Temperance and Divorces.
The United States Census Bureau
has recently finished the first thorough
divorce census for many years. It is
full of matter for deep thought, and
contains one of the most striking argu-
ments for temperance reform which
has ever been used in the great
crusade.

Whatever may be one's individual
opinion about the justice and right of
any divorce whatsoever, or about the
cause or causes for which it should be
granted, everyone who values the
sanctity of the home must become
sensible of the figures disclosed in the
census. At least one marriage in
every twelve results in divorce—such is
the startling and uncontradictable
assertion of the Census Bureau. This
rate is far above that of any other
country in the world, and is two and
a half times the number of divorces,
in proportion to population, which
prevailed forty years ago.

The temperance aspect of the divorce
statistics gives a key to the situation.
When the drink traffic has finally
been removed from this country, and
the people interested in demanding the
same standard of morality from man
as from woman, then the divorce evil
will be reduced to an astonishing
extent. The American people are not
wanton and fall not in reverence of
marriage; but a powerful crusade of
enlightenment and exercise of the
ballot is necessary to drive out the
monsters which have been preying
upon the virtuous, the weak and the
untaught.
