State of New Jersey.

To the Hon. Henry O. Kelsey, Secretary of State:

Sin :- You are hereby directed to equie to be published in all of the newspapers of this State authorised to publish the laws of the last session of the Legislaure, by one insertion each we'k for the term of three months, in each of said newspapers, the proposed Amendments to the Constitution of New Jersey, passed by the last Legislature, and filed in your office by the Secretary of the Senate.

PROPOSED AMENDMENTS to the Constitution of the State of New Jersey.

ARTICLE I. RIGHTS AND PRIVILEGES. Insert as paragraph 19, a new paragraph, a

"19. No county, city, borough, town, town-ship, or village shall bereafter give any money or property, or loss its money or credit, to or in sid of any individual, association or corporation, or become security for, or be directly or indirectly the owner of, any stock or bonds of any association or corporation."

"20. No donation of land or appropriation of money shall be made by the state or any mu-nicipal corporation to or for the use of any so-ciety, association or corporation whatever."
