County Convention.

The fourteenth annual convention of Atlantic County W. C. T. U. met in the Baptist Church at Seaview on Sept. 24th, at 10 a. m. Mrs. Maurer, of Elwood, led in the morning devotion. In the absence of the County President, Dr. Eva W. Lake presided, and was greatly assisted in conducting the meetings by our State President, Mrs. Bourne.

Minutes of Spring Convention were read and approved; committees for the day appointed. Address of welcome given by Mrs. Tyson, responded to by Mrs. Price, of Bakersville. Pastor of the church introduced, and welcomed the ladies most cordially, congratulating them on their work in this county. Reports of County Superintendents then read, showing the most gain in amount of work done in the Evangelistic, Flower Mission, Literature, Sabbath Observance and Press work. Executive met at 1:30; also the other committees. Voted to have the Spring Convention in Egg Harbor in May, date to be set later on.

Resolutions were then presented and adopted on the anti-canteen law; the late calamity to our country; against saloons and narcotics, and others.

Election of officers for the coming year resulted in the choice of Mrs. Maurer, of Elwood, as President; our beloved County Superintendent, declining re-election. Mrs. E. C. Jenness was elected Corresponding Secretary; Mrs. Tryon, of Seaview, Recording Secretary; Dr. Eva W. Lake re-elected Treasurer.

At the evening session, Dr. Lake led in devotions, and Mrs. Bourne gave us one of her helpful lectures, helpful to White Ribboners and also those outside of our Union, our temperance friends.

Base-Ball.

There were several surprises, in a base-ball way, last Saturday, when the Abington team crossed bats with our sluggers.

Having on the previous Saturday defeated the strong Jenkintown club by the decisive score of 8 to 1, the Abingtons anticipated little difficulty in scoring a big victory over Hammonton. That they failed to realize their expectations was not in any way due to their poor playing, but must be credited to the fine all around work of the home boys, who played well together and took advantage of every opportunity.

It was a very pretty contest, and exciting enough to satisfy the most ardent rooter. Not a tally was made until the sixth inning, when Angelow reached first on a hit, was safe at second on Long's poor throw to catch him stealing, and scored on a line drive to right by Setley. This should have been the final score, but owing to some bad judgment by the visitors, the boys tallied four in their half of the eighth.

With one out, in this inning Setley corked out his third single, J. Jefferson received four wide ones, P. Jefferson flew out to left. Zoller was worried, and gave Conley a safe pass, filling the corners, with two out. Cordery, after getting his three balls and two strikes and fouling a half-dozen others, hit sharply down to third. Henderson, instead of retiring Cordery at first, attempted to catch the runner at third, but failed, and the bases were still full with another run in. Herbert followed with a cracking liner to left, and J. Jefferson and Conley counted. Helser hit past third, scoring Cordery and making the score five to nought in Hammonton's favor.

The Abingtons think they are the stronger team, and asked for another date, which will probably be given them.

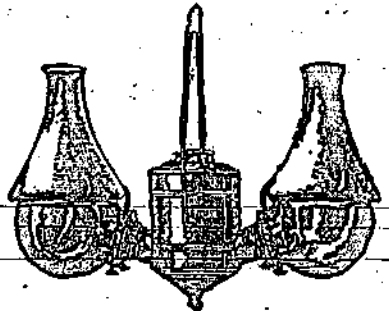
