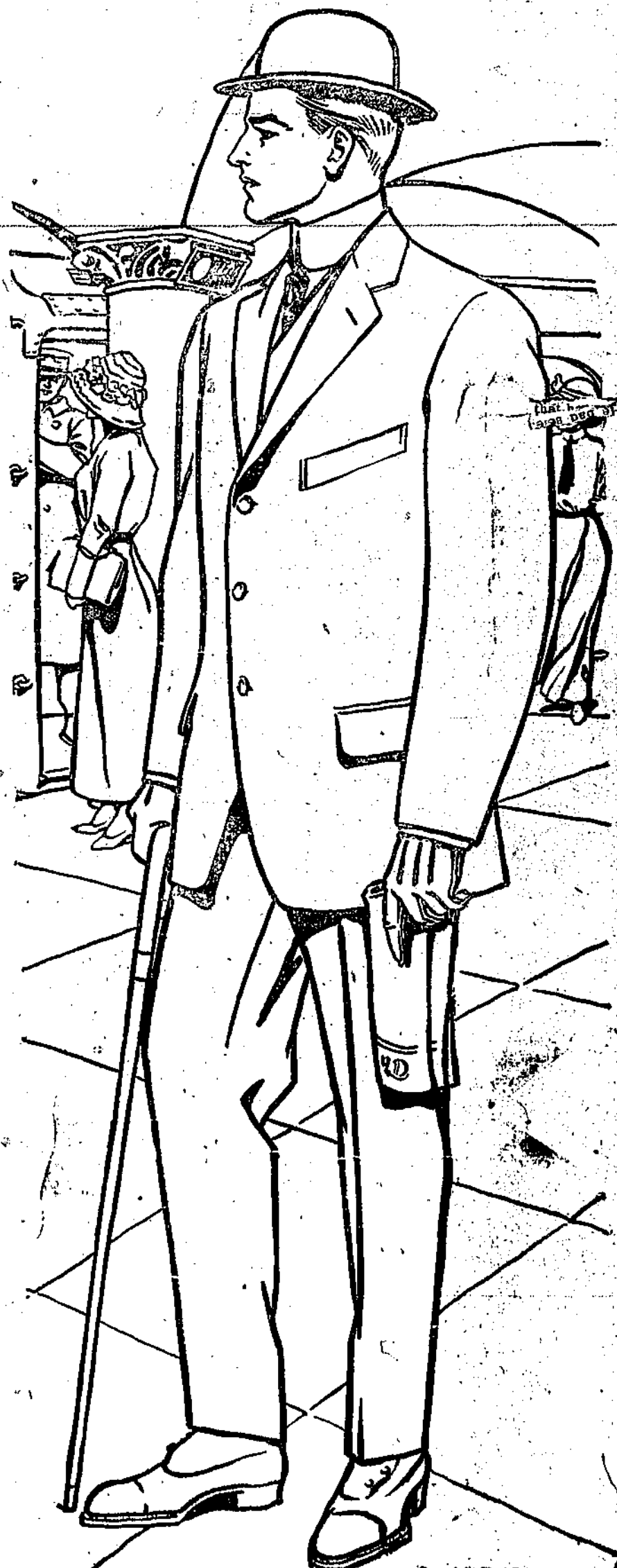

tion, and 1,960 men have been employed in the construction of the dam, which is overflowing full, so that he is to meet the growing demand for teachers. One of the most attractive and cheering features is that the school will be able to pay \$20,000 a year toward self-support, perhaps the secret of this generosity is the fact that they administer their own finances.

Another very spacious and modern grammar school is being built by the people at a cost of \$20,000, in the spot where he began his school. The school will be named toward the gift and bequest of \$15,000 from an African layman died at Lagos a few years ago, further donations from his descendants are being solicited.

Another interesting feature of the mission is the fact that the people of Onitsha and the whole of that area under the dominion of the U. 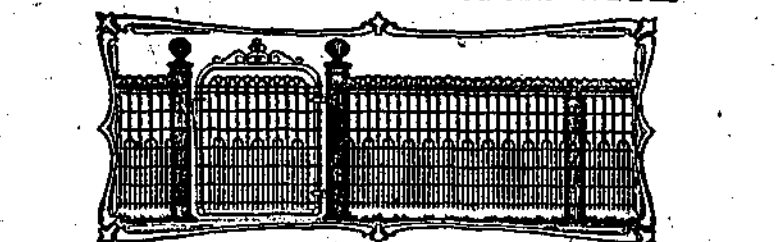
