If any articles are offered for exhibition not embraced in the Schedule are deemed worthy, a special premium will be awarded by the Executive-Committee.

All articles for competition must be on the ground by 10 o'clock A M if practicable.

At 10.30 o'clock A M the Committee will proceed to examine and award premiums and report in writing to the Secretary by 3 P M.

All stock must be on the ground at 10 A M. The Committees on the various divisions of horses, extile sheep and swine are requested to ascertain as far as possible the blood of the different animals.

The Committees will notice all articles exhibited in their several departments whether entitled to premiums or not.


