**Read DePuy's new advertisement.**  
Mr. Byrnes is putting up the first of the row of buildings designed for the accommodation of the shoemakers. These buildings will be sold on easy terms—cash, the balance in monthly installments of \$10 to \$15 per month. The buildings will be upon lots 50x150 feet, and will be sold for \$600 to \$900.

The three shoe factories in this place, though making little stir, have done more work and brought more money into the place than many suppose.  
Mr. Murphy's shop has been running less than six months; 21,000 pairs of shoes have been made, and \$7,000 paid the hands for work.

The Co-Operative shop, has been running since March 14th; 12,865 pairs have been made and \$6,400 paid the hands.  
Johnson & Osgood commenced work May 22d; 3,600 pairs have been made and \$200 paid the hands.  
Total—37,465 pairs, for the manufacture of which \$15,400 has been paid; a greater part to persons residing in Hammononton. Very good for five months from a new business.

I have just received a letter from a first class Yankee shoemaker containing an application for a chance to work in Hammononton free from St. Crispin dictation. He says "I could get work in New York but for the devilish Crispins." Rather strong language but very expressive. He is steady, temperate, and understands all parts, has worked fifteen years, but is pushed out because he does not wish to be dictated to by a set of foreigners. Thousands of the best Yankee shoemakers are in just his circumstances. At the seventh monthly meeting of the Absecon Loan and Building Association, nearly \$600 was sold on short loan, at 85 and 91.05. The association is progressing favorably.

The large vessel building for Capt. Will Lee, by Capt. J. G. Babcock and others, will probably be ready to launch about Christmas, but will not be taken out before spring.

Mr. Joseph Cooper, one of the original stockholders and directors of the Camden & Atlantic R. R., died of paralysis at his residence in Camden on Monday at the age of 72.

We have received from New Germany, (via Egg Harbor City,) a communication from several trustees and deacons of the Ref. church. We suppose it is written at the instigation of Frankel, who wishes to bolster up his failing fortunes. We shall investigate the matter as our leisure.

The M. E. church at Absecon, was re-opened last Sunday, Rev. Mr. Thomas, of Philadelphia, preaching the opening sermon. We were greatly surprised at the improved appearance of the church. The walls and ceilings have been painted in delicate tints, which, with the white trimmings, produce an agreeable effect. The entire wood-work has been re-painted, new carpets have been laid, and a general renovation made throughout. The cost of these improvements was a trifle over \$800. About \$350 was on hand, realized from festivals in the summer—leaving a deficiency of between \$450 and \$500. After the sermon this amount was raised without difficulty. Having done so well in the morning, it was proposed to try it again in the evening, and lift the debt of over \$600 for the parsonage. In this, too, they were successful, making about \$1100, raised by the church in one day. Can any congregation in the county beat this?
