

GOV. PENNYPACKER be corrected by having a law that shall be uniform inall parts of the United States. Then, there will be no more trips to Daketa, a six months' residence, and divorces granted that are really crimes. against laws of morality.

The leader in this important fight is Gov. Samuel W. Pennypacker, of Pennsylvania. At a recent session of the Penusylvania State Legislature an appropriation of \$10,000 was made for the purpose of having the Governor call-for-a-national-congress,-consisting of three men from each State, tobe appointed by the Governors. These are to draw up a uniform law which is afterward to be adopted by the Legislatures of each State. In this way to uniform law can be secured, and at the same time each State retains to right to regulate its own laws on the

The bill was introduced into the egislature by Senator William C roul, of Delaware County. Gov. 
