



The labor-saving machinery of the last half-century has transformed the undertaker from a carpenter to a funeral director; for his chief duty is no longer to painfully steam long boards into the sides of a coflin, but to intelligently and scientifically care for the dead. By his skill decomposition can now be held in check at will, for with the means and knowledge at present at his command he may choose the antiseptics best suited to his particular purpose. The American funeral director, as a result, has become the superior of the ancient Egyptian embalmer. How this has been accomplished will be described in subsequent announce-




