## DOGS HELP TO REDUCE CRIME

**SUGGESTIONS** made from time to time and seriously considered by the authorities of other cities concerning the addition of dogs to the police force, come naturally because of the wonderful record of such dogs in New York. A reduction of 80 per cent. in crime in four months is a record which makes a strong case for the performance of a bunch of dogs who look neither terrifying nor particularly brilliant, but who have saved lives and property in the hands of the crooks accustomed to making the outlying districts of New York their camping ground.

When the news leaked out in New York last January that some dogs were to be imported from Belgium for police service, the whole police force of that city seemed to be in a state of commotion. They poked fun at their comrades-to-be, spoke of disheartening competition of a reduction of wages, of the new style of uniform, which would be adopted, and in this they were aided by industrial newspaper humorists, who drew pictures of storekeepers handing out a sausage, via a hook, door-to-door, and of broken-hearted dog policemen, and the newspapers devoted editorials to the fact that the price paid for the dogs was just \$10 apiece, and no more. A public contract and no risk!

Belgium began it. To go back far enough, the business of putting dogs on the police rolls began in Ghent, Belgium, some two years ago. Ghent was fighting an epidemic of crimes, committed mainly in the suburbs of the city. Its regular police staff did not suffice, and, as the result of a lucky thought, the chief of police asked the head of the dog police, "A dog," he said, "can follow a feeding man more swiftly than a police officer. He is more nimble. He is full of courage. He can sniff out a thief in the world. He can squeeze through a small hole. He is a whole lot of police in himself. And the chief got the dog police. They eventually reached the police headquarters in New York City.

Five dogs were brought over, two to be trained for the business of policing the Brooklyn suburbs, and two to be trained for the business of policing the Manhattan, and Washington Heights, where apartment houses had not yet been built, but where old mansions stand, a ready prey to second-story men and their families. The dogs were trained for two weeks, where they began the task of sniffing them into their future work.

How They Are Trained. Every evening they were taken to the place where they were to watch rather than starting out on their beat, and were made acquainted with their future masters. Then they were taught how to search for thieves, how to lead the policeman to spots where a footpad might be hiding, how to obey promptly when ordered to pounce on a suspect.
