Parcel Post Changes.

There have been several changes made in parcel post rates, and in weights allowed. In consequence, quite large packages, up to twenty

pounds, resembling hat boxes, or dablia boxes, and dozens of eggs, are sent almost daily from our local post office.

The following table of rates will assist our readers to estimate cost nolds, State Suffrage organizer, of parcels to given points :

Local and rural delivery routes; five cents for first pound ; one cent for each two additional pounds or fraction thereof.
