GOOSE—HER RHYMES.

A correspondent informs me that the Tomb of John Newbery, in Waltham St. Lawrence churchyard, is likely to undergo the fate that overtakes all such monuments, unless properly and regularly cared for.

I have not seen it since I visited the quaint and quiet little village in the summer of 1836, when I was collecting for a life of "the philanthropic publisher of St. Paul's churchyard." Immortalized by Goldsmith in his "Vicar of Wakefield," Dr. Johnson in "The Idler," by Washington Irving in "The Teller of Tales," and by many other writers, who have recognized the influence of the first publisher who wrote, edited, compiled and published books for "all those little heads which are good for good," he is intended to be good.


We have traveled a long way since Newbery and Goldsmith co-operated in that famous list of books of which "Godly vs. Sloth," "Tommy's History," and "The best of the best," but it is very only for the fact that Newbery was the first to give the Rhymes and Jingles of Mother Goose to the world in collected form his memorial is not less honored by the long-spoken children wherever they may be found.

Newbery's original collection of Mother Goose melodies has, moreover, been so well received by the literary world to believe that Goldsmith had hand in the editing, annotating and

A claim to have been the originator of the Mother Goose collection was made about thirty years ago on behalf of Mrs. Goose, or Vergoose, the mother-law of Thomas Fleet, a printer who resided in Boston, U. S. A., during the latter's boyhood. The demand for this contention was amply demonstrated by W. H. Whitmore, the present-day registrar of Boston, in his preface to a facsimile of Newbery's edition, which he published in 1892; but which superstition and modern myths have heaped upon the bones of the real Mother Goose, the dear old dame of America.

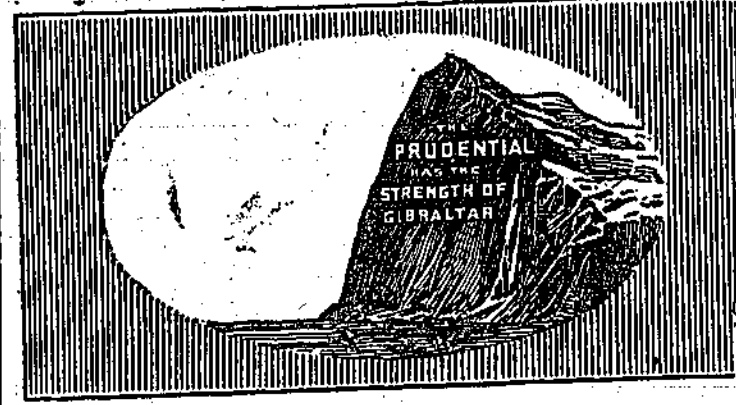
