





With fifteen children in the family, Henry Moore and wife of Monree Valle Ohio, manage not to be lonesome. Aside from this they keep telerably busy in keeping up the household on \$1.50 a day. How they do it is one of the secret making both ends meet. But they did it when there were seventeen children in the house and when the father earned only \$1.20 a day. Mr. Moore works in a paper mill. He mixes the brown paste that is rolled and pressed into sheet and turned out as wrapping paper. At present he gets \$1,50 a day. Mr. Moore has reduced economy to a science. Until recently he only made six and one-third cents a day for each member of his family. The children are all healthy and happy, too, and according to the word of the father, get plenty to eat. The family eats three or four loaves of brend at a meal. Coffee must be made by the gallon; soup by the kettleful, and a large kettle at that. The number of dishes that are used is alarming, and to look at them would make the average bired girl




