The schools are in better condition this year than ever before, as maintains in New York. the men in charge have had a bronder experience with the activiities of the farmers in the county. The equipment also is better, and courses of study have been arranged so that the student may spend all his time studying some phase of agriculture of particular interest to him and not be hampered in any way by the setbacks to be S. J. R. experienced in any new institution.

The Vocational School staff is auxious to secure a large number of full time students for the coming winter season. The full time students attend three hours daily five days a week. It is to be hoped that the men are beginning to arrange their farm work so that it will be possible to attend these classes when they open on November 6th for the afternoon sessions

from 1 to 4 daily. For those who find it absolutely impossible to attend in the day time, there are evening classes at which a student may attend for two or three nights a week on regu lar dates

The day students have the ad vantage of spending more time and getting a broader education than can be expected in any of the night courses.

The student is given an author ized course of study on a topic of his own choosing, such as peach growing or sweet potato raising, or fertilizers, etc. While pursuing this course of study the student is given all of the individual attention necessary to complete the course satisfactorily. In addition to this there will be lectures and study on general agricultural topics, home multation and improvement, plant discares and injurious insects, gen eral spray and fertilizer campaigns and shop work, along with laboratory work with soils and their care
