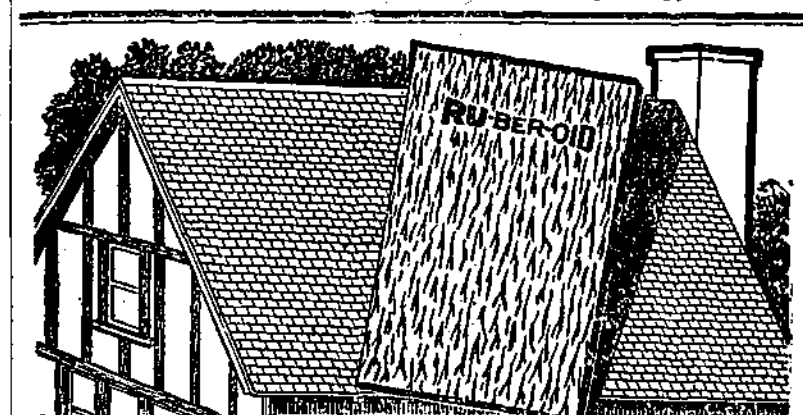

The proposition for paving Bellevue Avenue has been generally misunderstood in a financial way. It was said that the State was to pay one-third of the cost, the County one-third, the Town the same; but Hammonton would have to pay for its own gutters, making our share much greater. That was incorrect.

The State officials were to appropriate its share from the State motor fund, but this was exhausted, and it is to come from the general road fund. But the law provides that from this source the Commissioner shall pay forty per cent of the cost, considerably better for us. The balance, but sixty per cent, will be divided, including gutters, between the County and Town, making our share less than it would be if equally divided between the three. It seems that our Freeholders are competent to protect local interests, and have done well.

Last Sunday and Monday were mild and beautiful days—the hammocks and lawns being favorite resting places. A heavy thunder shower, about dusk, brought a cold wave, and pulled down the thermometer from eighty-five to fifty. It was cold all day, Tuesday, and by Wednesday morning it was at forty-one, with a heavy white frost. Temperature moderated considerably and by Friday morning was 53.

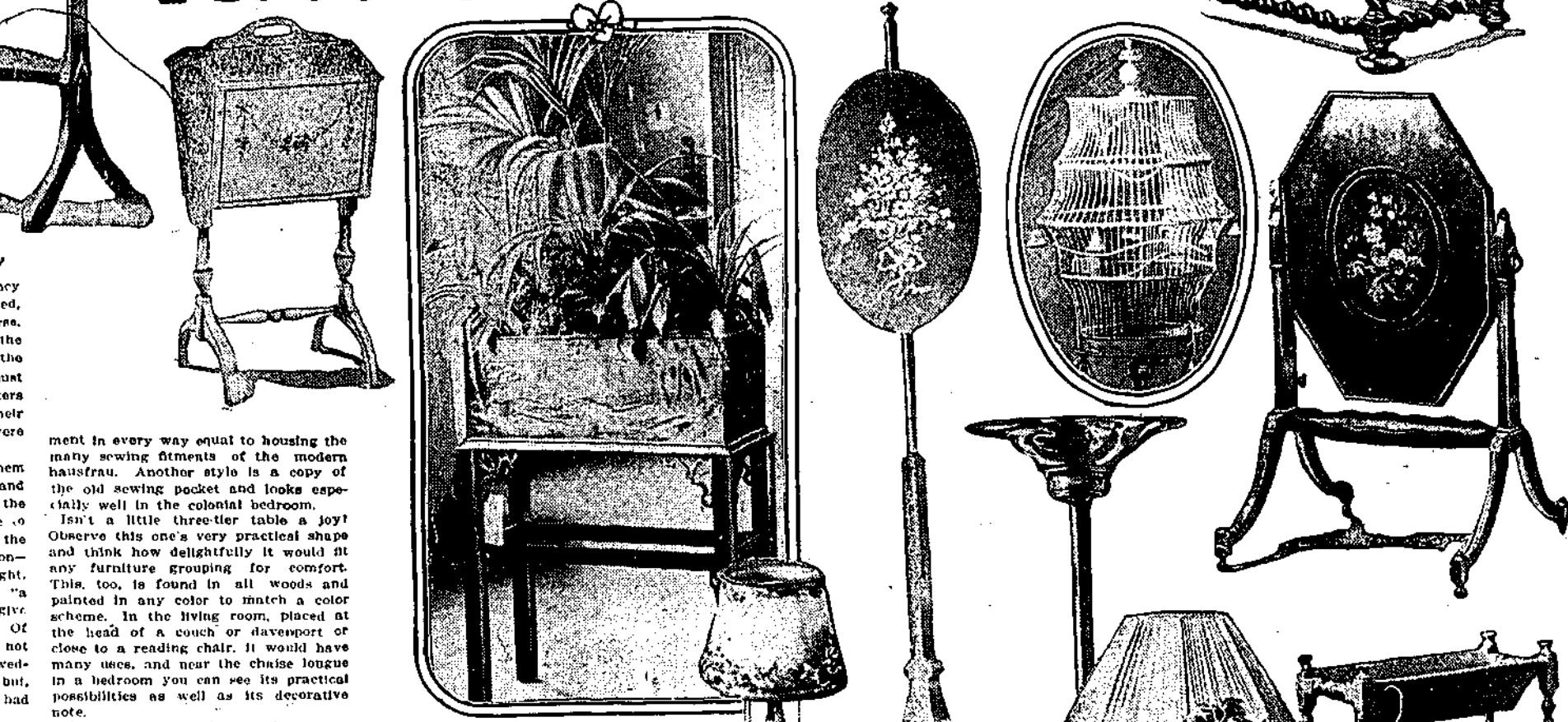
