Why not take in the Peace Jubilee  
at Philadelphia? It's to be an event  
of more than ordinary interest. \$100,  
000 will be raised by the city and  
citizens to make it a success. The  
President of the United States has  
promised to be present, as well as most  
of the members of his Cabinet, and  
there will be an array of distinguished  
men of the Army and Navy who will  
occupy a conspicuous place in the pa-  
rade. Special efforts are being made to  
have 17,000 soldiers in line, who have  
enlisted in our late war with Spain,  
and magnificent floats, representing  
the business interest of the city, will be  
a marked attraction. Some of the  
large battleships will be anchored in  
the Delaware, gaily trimmed for the  
occasion. Governor Hastings will set  
apart Oct. 27th as a holiday, to give  
all who desire an opportunity to see it.  
It will be one of the most historical  
occasions the city has had since the  
Centennial, and we should not let it pass  
by without a good look.

Among those who ought to go are  
the wide awake children of sufficient  
age who are acquainting themselves  
with history, and wish to take in an  
historical event of a lifetime. Also the  
up-to-date teachers who are not content  
with getting all their information from  
books, but with open vision take in  
grand scenes that will be displayed,  
from which they can draw many practi-  
cal lessons. Also parents who are de-  
sirous of broadening the ideas of their  
children by a scene that will live in  
their memory the rest of their days.

To encourage this, the Railroads are

The Peace Jubilee at Philadelphia will  
undoubtedly be the greatest demonstra-  
tion ever held in the United States.  
The grand military and naval review,  
civil and industrial parade, rededication  
of Independence Hall restored to its  
colonial appearance, and the unveiling  
of Gen. Grant's monument, will all be

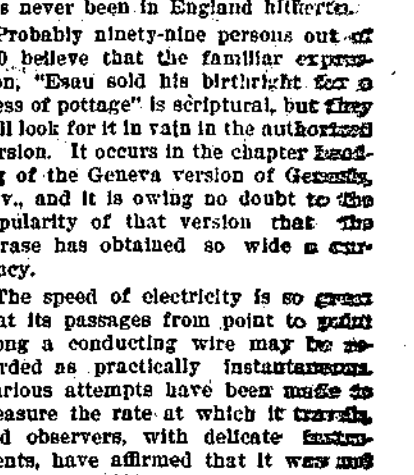

Gettysburg, Luray, Washington.  
Over the battlefield of Gettysburg, thro' the picturesque Blue Mountains, via Hagerstown and Antietam, and down the beautiful and historic Shenandoah Valley to the unique Caverns of Luray; thence across the rolling hills of Northern Virginia to Washington, is the route of this tour—a section of the country intensely interesting from both a historic and a scenic standpoint.
