## Pennsylvania Railroad

### Bulletin:

### OPENING OF THE GREAT PENNSYLVANIA STATION IN NEW YORK.

On Sunday, November 26, full train service will be  
inaugurated by the Pennsylvania Railroad to and from its  
new station at Seventh Avenue and Thirty-second Street,  
New York City.

The location of the Pennsylvania Station, one block  
from Broadway, two blocks from Fifth Avenue, is in the  
heart of the hotel, club, and theatre district of Manhattan.  
Within a short radius are located the majority of the big  
retail stores and restaurants. The Seventh Avenue surface  
cars and the Eighth Avenue surface cars pass its doors; the  
Thirty-fourth Street surface cars (cross-town) pass its Thirty-  
fourth Street entrance; and stations of the Sixth Avenue  
Elevated and Hudson and Manhattan Tubes are a short  
block from its main entrance.

Time tables showing the service to and from the Penn-  
sylvania Station are now being arranged, and may be  
obtained at ticket offices before the opening of the station.

Connections will be made at Manhattan Transfer [near  
Newark] with local trains to and from the downtown stations  
by the way of Jersey City, so that downtown New York  
passengers who desire may continue to use the Cortland and  
Debrosses Street Stations and the Hudson Terminal Station  
of the Hudson and Manhattan Tubes.

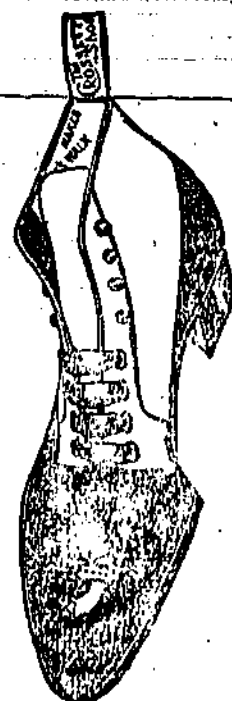
