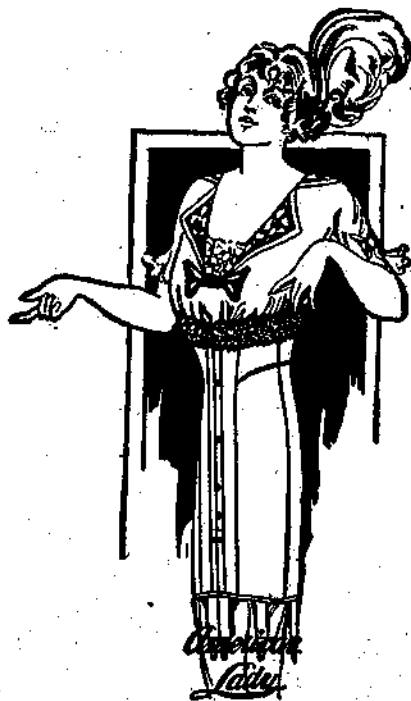

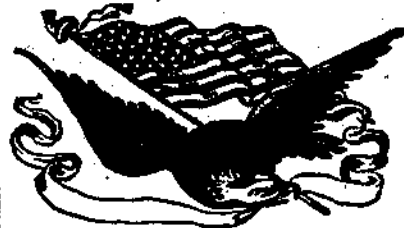

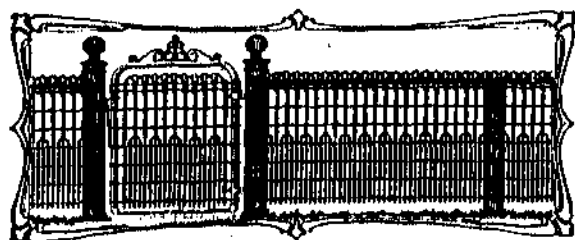

IN CHANCERY OF NEW JERSEY

To Anne E. Abel, Susan Anna Willa Scott,
Theodore W. Abel, and his heirs, devisees,
and personal representatives:
By virtue of an order of the Court of Chan-
cery of New Jersey, made on the day of the
date hereof, in a cause wherein George Elvins
is complainant and you are defendants, you
are required to appear, plead, answer or de-
fend to the bill of said complainant on or before
the first day of December, A. D. 1913; and that
in default thereof, such decree be made against
you as the Chancery shall deem equitable and
just.

The said bill is filed to settle and quiet the
title of the complainant, George Elvins, in and
to all those certain tracts or parcels of land
and premises situated in the Town of Hammonton,
County of Atlantic, and State of New Jer-
sey, bounded as follows:

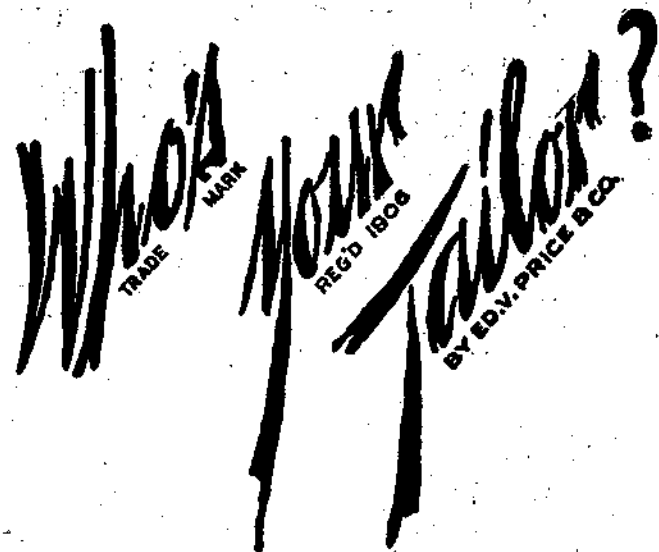
Tract 1. Beginning at a forked pine lettered
P. 1 and by the south side of Driveway (Branch,
thence (1) south one degree and twenty
minutes, east along Robert Anderson's land
thirty-six and fifty hundredths chains to a
point; thence (2) north seventy-eight degrees
and thirty minutes, east six and fifty hun-
dredths chains to land of L. Howers; thence,
(3) along Howers' line north thirty-two
degrees, east eight and ninety hundredths
chains to the line forming the third course in
the original survey of the seventy acre lot of
which this land hereof conveyed is a part.
Thence, (4) along said original line north
forty-one degrees and twenty minutes, west
twelve and eighty hundredths chains; thence
(5) south eighty-three degrees, west eight
chains; thence (6) north seventy-eight degrees
