and grass is filling up that part so fast  
that it is only a question of time when  
it will be impossible to get a boat from  
the Park down to the mill. We have  
been told that if that part of the Lake  
would be cleared out thoroughly, there  
could be more boats kept; and one  
man, and possibly two, would keep  
steam launches. Of course, people  
living in the town would have to keep  
their boats at the Park end, and it is  
very unpleasant to have to force your  
way up through all that grass, and run  
the risk of injuring your boat on a  
stump. We trust that something may  
be done this fall in the way of money  
donated and work given, so that we  
may have a Lake that will surpass any

GEORGE SENT.

How about that last Sunday bicycle race? Our Council were stirred up by the news, and by the appeal of citizens, and met on Saturday evening, informally. Sunday, Messrs. Watkins and Bachelor, of the Law and Order Committee, were at the proposed Hammononton terminus, but saw no racers. It is said that they stopped at Maple Street long enough to turn about and return to Egg Harbor City. But, did they have a race? Monday's Atlantic Review said:

As soon as it became known abroad that a Sunday race was to be held on the county road, no less than a dozen citizens in various parts of the county, from Pleasantville to Hammononton, wrote letters to the Sheriff, asking him to stop the decoration of the Sabbath. These requests were from people of unquestioned standing in the communities, and so general and so urgent was the protest that the Sheriff was at Egg Harbor yesterday to stop the race. He hour set for the race to begin and went to Zimmerman's Hotel which was the wheelmen's headquarters for the day. There he met a man the Sheriff believed to be Jack George, the chief promoter of the race, and instructed him that Sunday racing in Atlantic County must cease. The sheriff made it quite plain that the citizens of the county desire a peaceful Sabbath and that there is a law to provide it, and in a courteous manner requested the race to be called off. The racing officials made a protest, claiming that no one is disturbed by the racing and attempted to argue the Sheriff to let the event go on. Finding that a warning had no effect upon the visiting citizens, the Sheriff then positively prohibited the holding of the race. Then it was that the officials promised on their honor that no race should be held. Reports received from Egg Harbor late last night indicate that some attempt at a race was held, the event evidently degenerated into a grand scramble and crash in which many cyclists were hurt. In fact, it is reported that Jack George actually went out on the porch of the hotel and publicly announced that the race was off officially before Sheriff Kirby felt satisfied that the law would be upheld. According to reports the race was called on a trifle before 11:30 o'clock, in which thirty participants were involved.

Evidently, Sheriff Kirby is a man to be depended upon to do his duty in an emergency. It is now stated that another race is announced for Oct. 29th. Our Councilmen have decided that it shall not enter Hammononton, and will be prepared to enforce the law. Correct.


