The augual report of the Bureau of Labor Statistics for 1898 is now in course of preparation by Chief William Stainsby and James Morgan, the bureau secretary. This report will present statistics on two new subjects, as announced by Secretary Morgan. One is the cost of living in the various sections of the State, and the other the number of persons employed in New Jersey by the different steam and street railroads. In statistics of manufacturers, this year's tables would be fuller than last year, as a much larger number of manufacturere bave turnished information asked for. The building and loan statistics, Mr. Morgan said, would be on the same lines as heretofore.

The statistics as to the cost of living are being complied from answers sent by local dealers throughout the State to a circular, asking them the prevailing prices in their sections of the more important of household necessities. Out of 310 circulars sent out 303 replies bave been received, giving the prices for June, 1898, of flour, meat, potatoes, coal and other things, which go to make up the bulk of living expenses.

These figures have not been tabulated yet in a way to permit comparisons. The tables will not take up the question of routs this year, but Secretary Morgan said that it was the intention to widen the ecope of the inquiry next year on the expense of living.

Another feature of this year's report will be the presentation of a draft of the English and French laws defining the responsibility of scuployers for damages for injuries received by employees while engaged in their work. It is, Mr. Morgan said, a well-settled law in New Jersey that an employer is not responsible for injuries done an employee where the injury results from the neglicence of a co-employee. This is not the case under the English and French laws Provision is made in the English law particularly for damages to be agreesed acainst the business of the employer.

It was not the intention of the report to champion any particular law on the question, but to give publicity to laws already in existence and leave it to the people and the Logislature to take such action as might seem to them proper.




