It has to begin with a statement which old residents of classic Princeton don't like to see in print—the statement that Princeton hasn't always had the most perfect municipal government imaginable. It is to be hoped that this way of putting it is sufficiently mild to save Princetonian sensibilities; it is certainly mild enough for the facks of the situation. At all events there has all along been plenty of material for Dr. Tompkins to talk shout when the spirit moved him to talk in hipulpit about lax law enforcement locally—particularly the failure of the police to keep liquor out of town since Prohibition went into effect.
