The third triennial convention of the New Jersey State Sunday School Association, and thirty second anniversary of the State S. S. Association, will be held in the State Street M. E. Church, Trenton, on Wednesday and Thursday, Nov. 13th and 14th. Interesting sessions are promised. All friends of Sunday Schools are invited.

It would be difficult to boil down into a more readable and understandable shape the record of Hon. Leon Abbett, Democratic candidate for Governor:

1. He voted against the abolition of slavery.
2. Voted against the bill for the State to make a loan for the purposes of war, to pay bounties to the soldiers.
3. Voted to strike out of the act to pay soldiers' mothers and families, "without distinction of color," so as to deprive the colored soldier's family of any help.
4. One of only eight in the Assembly to vote against a bill to allow soldiers' families six dollars per month while they were at the front.
5. Voted against the bill providing for the state to furnish one-legged soldiers with crutches.
6. Voted against allowing New Jersey soldiers to vote in the field.
7. Voted to strike the name of Abraham Lincoln from a resolution of thanks for his services in the war.
8. Voted against a resolution to purchase a portrait of Mr. Lincoln, to hang in the Assembly chamber, after his assassination.
9. Voted in 1865 to pay his salary as a legislator in gold, when gold was \$2.00 on the dollar, thus more than doubling his pay, and that when every laborer was paid in greenbacks.
10. In 1869 he championed the Erie railroad wrecker, Fiske, and was the advocate of all their schemes.
11. Was attorney of the Morris and Essex Railroad, and fought to exempt them from any State tax other than one-half of one per cent.
12. He killed ballot reform.

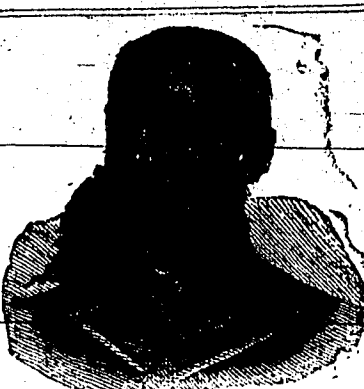

That Railroad Tax.

During the past week several thousand and circulars have been distributed through the mails, attacking the record of Senator Gardner, particularly upon the corporation tax law of 1884. This circular, like many another political document is valuable to the Democracy principally because it does not tell the whole truth. The first impression it gave us was its long delay—this law being five years old. When this bill was first prepared, its authors were working in the dark, with no precedent to work from. It was necessary to so frame it that no court would reverse its provisions; and justice required that it should be fair in all its details. As introduced, one section provided that the State Board of Assessors should add to the entire capital stock of each road the market value of all its bonds, and use these figures as its net assessable value. Other sections provided that its franchise, its road bed, its rails, ties, rolling stock, etc., etc., should be assessed. In other words, after assessing all its capital (actual cash and borrowed money) then assess the separate articles for which the capital has been expended—thus taxing it all twice. Very properly, Mr. Gardner, as the spokesman of many who saw this unjust provision, offered several amendments, to exempt the separate items. Leavitt right, as every fair-minded man must admit. This is a fair sample of the charges against Mr. Gardner in the circular.

One more item will show the circular's unfairness. There is considerable said about "equal taxation," and the statement is made that it is a law providing for such taxation had been allowed to pass, Hammononton's tax rate in 1888 would have been \$19.88 per \$1000, instead of \$22.50. Let's see. "Equal taxation" would require that our assessors should value all property as the State Assessors value it. If we had 100 cents on some unusual property, we do not know of one piece of real estate in our town lots that is assessed at more than fifty cents on the dollar—many will not exceed fifty—some still lower. Of course, this would actually divide the rate by two if no more money were to be raised, but it would increase our proportion of all outside taxes, and the total amount to be paid would be much larger. For instance, the state school tax. In 1888, Hammononton paid \$1739.51, and received in return \$2414.69. Under "equal" assessments, we would have paid at least double the amount we did pay; but as the amount returned is based on the number of children in town of school age, we should have received the same, or \$1000 less than we paid. We speak for Hammononton, and for to see that Mr. Gardner erred in voting against this bill. Further, one "equal taxation" scheme provided that all railroad taxes should be paid into the taxing district where the property is located, instead of (as now) into the state treasury. (How much of this would Hammononton receive? Look at your county map, and see what a trifling sum would be paid into the township; then remember that the loss of this to the state would necessitate some measure to pay expenses of the State government, which the present railroad tax entirely covers. Of course a direct tax would be the re-

sult, as the only way to raise the funds,—again increasing our total rate. Some of the great cities where railroad property is immense in value, would profit by the proposed change; but our Senator was looking out for the interests of his own county and voted against it. He did well, and deserves your vote because of it.

There is much more in this circular, just as unfair and untruthful as this to which we have referred; but, as several have remarked, it is a democratic campaign document, prepared for political purposes, and circulated when apparently too late for Mr. Gardner to follow it with a reply, and its statements should be received with great allowance for the desperate condition of that party, who see the hand writing on the wall, and already feel themselves slipping from the seat of power.

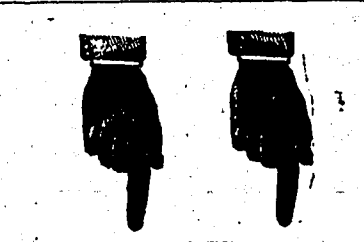

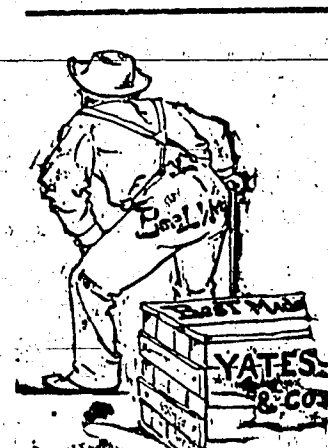
