Town Council Meeting.

Regular meeting last Saturday eve-
ning, 28th inst., all members present.
The Highway Committee reported
improvements at Bellevue Avenue and
Fourth Street nearly completed. Work
had been discontinued temporarily, but
will be resumed, as ordered at special
town meeting. Three and two-thirds
miles of street have been gravelled this
year, besides repairs elsewhere. Chal-
lenger Boyer assisted telephone officials
in locating poles. The Company has
agreed to maintain poles in both fire
houses.

Street Light Committee report dis-
satisfaction at several points—lights not
burning.

Law and Order Committee reported
eleven dogs captured, the past month,
and but one redeemed. Notified Messrs.
Stevens and Zimmerman, promoters of
the race advertised for Sunday, 20th,
that Council would not permit the race
within town limits, and received the
following very courteous reply:

"Received your notice in regard to
Sunday racing, for which information I
thank you kindly, and you can rest
assured we shall not attempt to violate
your order. We will postpone our race
until Thanksgiving Day (and will pub-
lish same), provided we can have your
consent to use the road on that day. If
you have any objection to this latter
decision, please inform me in due time.
Thanking you in advance, I am very
respectfully yours, B. B. STEVENS.
