The liberal road law of New Jersey is bringing about an excellent condition of the state's highways. According to the report of State Road Commissioner Budd, Jersey farmers are showing more interest in good roads this year than ever before, and the increase in this improvement in the next two years is likely to be double that of 1898 and 1899. In the last named year, the increase over the previous year was 31 miles of completed road, and there are now 118 miles of finished public roads in the state. Under the law, farmers pay ten per cent of the cost, the state pays one-third, the county the rest.

**HEATS THE UPPER ROOMS.**  
~~Hot Air Ducts for Fireplaces Which~~  
**Economizes on Fuel.**  
Fireplaces in a house are both a convenience and a luxury, and it is certain they would be used more frequently if any reliable means could be found to heat the upper rooms.



**—HOT-AIR DUCT FOR FIREPLACES.**

for the purpose. In the drawing we show a fireplace recently designed by John F. Beck, of Atlanta, Ga., which seems capable of heating the upper rooms to a comfortable temperature.

It consists of a metallic casing, which is inserted in place of the brick partition usually placed between fireplaces and usually about 12 in. thick.

the lower portion of the drum is narrow, and any pattern of grate can be attached to it, while the upper portion is wide and flat, and can be made of wire mesh, or grate, leaving, however, sufficient room for the passage of smoke through the chimney. Inside the drum a series of plates are so arranged at the air inlets as to cause the air to enter in a tortuous route before entering the pipe at the top of the drum. The fresh air is conducted into the bottom of the drum through a tube at the end of the room, and is heated by the heat of the smoke from the fire of the basement windows. As the air is heated it rises through the pipe the chambers, causing the fresh air to be pumped into the upper portion of the room, and thus also a perfect ventilation of air, free from all smoke of the fireplace.

Introduced Sept. 29, 1900.  
Passed October 6, 1900.  
Be it ordained by the Council of the Town of Hammonton—  
Sec. 1. That all persons residing in the Town of Hammonton owning and using wagons with tires four inches or broader in width shall be allowed a rebate of one dollar per wheel per annum for each wheel used on said wagons, from the taxes levied and assessed against the owners and users thereof.  
Sec. 2. That the Collector of the Town of Hammonton is hereby authorized to allow the said rebates upon proof, satisfactory to him, of the ownership and use of such wagons.  
Sec. 3. That this ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its passage.
