Republican County Men Elected!

As we expected, the Republican nominees on the National ticket have been elected by the people. It will not be certainly known for a few days just how many electoral votes they will have, but as we write the indications are for from 292 to 300. There are 447 members in the Electoral College, making 224 votes necessary to elect.

In 1896, Mr. McKinley received 271; Mr. Bryan 173. New Jersey gave over 52,000 plurality, and will have an increased majority in the Legislature.

Congressman Gardner was re-elected; his estimated pluralities in the four counties being nearly 12,000.






